As the day of 20th Rabi al-Akhar draws near once more, my thoughts drift with a tide of memory and longing. This year, 12th October will not only mark the 82^{nd} Milad of the 53rd Dai al-Mutlaq, His Holiness Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin, but it will also be the first such celebration I witness without my father by my side. My father, Dr. Abdul Sami Bubere, passed away in June, leaving behind not just his words and his pen, but the quiet resonance of a life shaped by reverence. Though he is gone, his voice still remains within me—his devotion, his awe for Syednas, etched not only in the articles he wrote but in the way he lived when he spoke of them.

The symmetry of this Milad carries a rare depth. In honour of his revered predecessor, Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin has chosen to mark his own life on the very day his father, Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin, was born. It is as though two streams—one of legacy, the other of vision-have flowed together into a single river whose waters nourish a people across generations. I feel that current all the more this year, recalling how my father once wrote that Svedna Mohammed Burhanuddin was "a man who carried silence like a crown." That same silence now surrounds me, yet within it glows the enduring light of wisdom passed seamlessly from father to son-from Syedna Burhanuddin to Syedna Mufaddal, from my father to me.

Milad is never just a birthday: it is the celebration of a life lived with

purpose, a reminder of a leadership that has guided with knowledge and given with heart. The grandeur of this occasion is not confined to the colours of its gatherings, but in the schools that rise, the homes that are uplifted, the voices that are steadied, and the countless lives quietly touched by the Dai's presence. In Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin we see a leader who tends to both thought and spirit, who nurtures learning as carefully as he nurtures faith, not as two separate tasks but as intertwined strands that strengthen each other. His life is a constant reminder that knowledge shows us the way, but the way is only complete when walked with sincerity

Each Milad adds another layer to this ongoing story. Year after year, values are not repeated like rituals they are returned to like roots. The Dawoodi Bohra community has never seen remembrance and progress as opposites, but as companions walking the same path. In Surat at Al-Istifada al-Ilmiyya, in Ashara Mubaraka sermons across the world, in daily lives shaped by devotion and service, faith breathes alongside action—and action, refined through knowledge, keeps faith alive.

For me this year, Milad is not only about collective renewal but also about what I have inherited. My father carried deep admiration for Svedna Mohammed Burhanuddin and later for Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin. He saw in them qualities that needed no boundaries of creed to be recognised. He called it his privilege to write about them, to set down in words what so many felt in their hearts. Every token of remembrance he received from the Syedna—a letter, a shawl, a blessing—he kept not as a writer collecting acknowledgement, but as a man holding on to grace.

And now, as I prepare to attend the 82nd Milad Celebrations at the Zampa Bazar in Surat, I can just merely imagine how his gaze would have softened to see the community rising once again around their leader. I picture the slight smile on his lips, the kind of smile that comes when the heart is full but words are few. I look at the keepsakes he left behind, folded with care, and I realise that their true worth was never in the gesture itself but in the way he received them-with quiet gratitude and deep regard.

So, this Milad, for me, is celebration and mourning woven together. It is joy for a leader who



continues to guide his people with humble strength, and grief for the father whose wonder at that guidance once shaped the lens through which I, too, learned to see. Yet in that duality lies a form of completion. Just as Syedna honours his father's life through the celebration of his own, I will do the same. I will celebrate and honour, rejoice and remember. And in that confluence of memory and meaning, perhaps pain will slowly soften into gratitude.

As an editor, I have always believed words preserve, but as a son, I now understand that legacies must not only be preserved—they must be carried in the living of a life. The Dawoodi Bohra community carries forward the wisdom of their Dai. I, in my own way, continue to carry forward the values of my father: to honour truth, to use words as bridges, and to recognise the sacred in human gestures.

And so, as the moon of 20^{th} Rabi al-Akhar rises, and voices swell in devotion, I will stand among thousands with both loss and light in my heart. In that moment, I will feel the presence of both Syednas, their lives flowing as rivers that nourish faith across time. And, somewhere in the unseen, I know my father's hand will rest upon my shoulder. This Milad, for me, will be more than celebration—it will be a journey of remembrance, a reminder that neither faith nor love is bound by time, and that some legacies do not end, they simply continue—in silence, in memory, in light. ■

The story of Raj Builders itself is deeply tied to faith and community

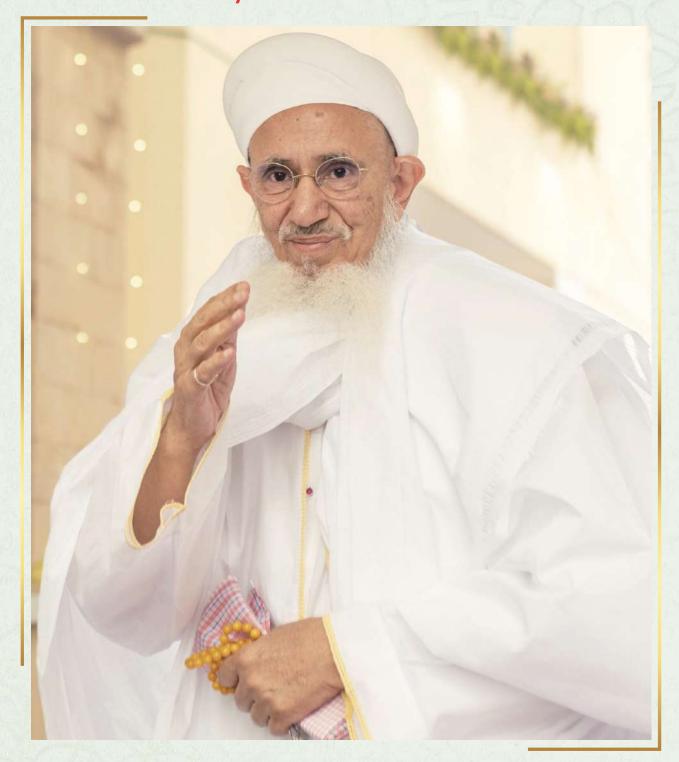

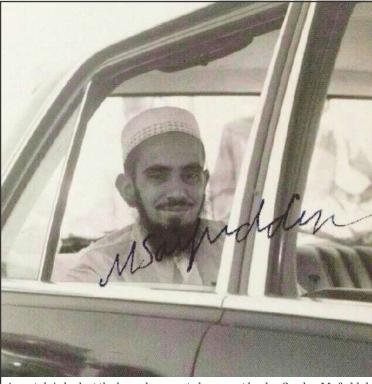
My name is Moti K. Daryanani, and I often tell people that I am one of the few fortunate souls who can call His Holiness, Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin, my childhood friend.

Those words alone feel extraordinary to say. My story with His Holiness Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin goes back decades. Our paths first crossed at the Cathedral and John Connon School in Mumbai, where we shared the same desk from the second standard. Childhood is usually remembered in fragments like the chatter of classrooms, the games on the field, or the sound of the school bell. But what stands out most sharply in my memory is the presence of the special boy who sat beside me.

He spoke little, but silence was never emptiness with him. He had a way of listening, of observing, that gave you the sense he was absorbing far more than he revealed. Even at that young age, he struck me as deeply intuitive, the sort who saw beneath the surface of things. I distinctly remember how each morning, he arrived at school in a large bus from Saifee Mahal, often surrounded by a dozen or more members of his family. I remember being struck by the sight of a bus filled with cousins, siblings, relatives and yet he always carried himself with humility, never making that part of his life feel like a spectacle.

On the playground, His Holiness gave way to a different kind of energy. Cricket was his great love, and I still recall the gleam in his eyes when he bowled someone out. Wickets brought him a rare burst of outward joy, a boyish thrill that lit up his face. He was also active in boxing, showing a determination and discipline unusual for our age. Even in those games, you could see that he played not for glory, but for the satisfaction of giving

Life, as it often does, carried us on different paths after those school years. Decades passed before I saw him again, but destiny arranged that reunion in a way that made me realise just how much he had grown, not only in stature but in spirit. I saw him in a caravan on Marine Drive one evening. And in that moment I knew that I had to reconnect with

him. It was a simple encounter at first: old friends catching up, exchanging memories of our boyhood days. Yet he carried with him a warmth that went far beyond nostalgia. He invited me to Saifee Mahal, and that visit marked the beginning of my seeing him not just as the boy I once knew, but as the spiritual leader he had become.

Later, I had the privilege of travelling to Surat to meet him. That experience is etched into my mind as something transformative. The streets were alive with anticipation. Crowds had gathered in lines, stretching further than I could see, all waiting for a single glimpse of him. What struck me most was not simply the devotion of the people, but the way he met that devotion. He gave his time, his attention, his gaze. He had no seconds truly to himself because every moment was absorbed by the needs of his followers, the questions they brought, and the hopes they carried. Watching him, I understood that his life was not his own. It belonged to those who sought him, who leaned on him, who looked up to him.

His family, too, carried that same generosity of spirit. His sons and relatives welcomed me with

warmth that never felt formal or distant. Despite the immense responsibility that surrounds them, they remain grounded, embracing visitors like me with genuine affection. That balance of bearing the weight of leadership while still making space for personal kindness is something I have always admired.

I also had the blessing, years earlier, of meeting his revered father, His Holiness Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin, at his Notting Hill mansion in London after I was married. I remember that day vividly. Syedna Burhanuddin was jovial, hearty, and full of life. He spoke with a generosity that immediately put me at ease. The way he welcomed me was not the way a religious head greets a stranger, but the way a father greets a son. That spirit of kindness. I believe, was inherited and amplified by his successor.

What I see in Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin today is a leader who has embraced a life of relentless service. He has no interest in politics, no desire for worldly positions of power. And yet, he keeps a keen awareness of what is happening in the world. He listens, he learns, he observes. Knowledge for him is not a tool for ambition, but a way to remain connected to the realities his community must

I have often noticed that when you sit with him, he looks directly into your eyes and it's not a fleeting glance, but a gaze that seems to reach into your very soul. You feel seen, understood, even before you have finished speaking. And when he responds, his answers carry a weight that feels both deeply personal and divinely guided. It is a rare gift to make every person feel as though they are the only one in the room, especially when millions look to you for guidance.

In conversation, he still remains quiet as he used to in school, sparing with words, but behind that silence lies constant prayer. I am certain of it. Even when he is not speaking, his lips move in remembrance, his heart fixed in devotion. His education, his intuitive nature, and his faith form an inseparable whole. This, I believe, is why his followers feel such profound love for him. Wherever I go, be it Africa, London, or Mumbai, whenever I mention his name to members of his community, I see their faces soften into smiles. It is as if just hearing his name evokes comfort, belonging, and pride.

The demands on him are relentless. His schedule leaves little room for personal ease. Meals are hurried, rest is sacrificed, and solitude is almost nonexistent. And yet, he never complains, never withdraws. Instead, he pours himself into his community, travelling across countries, crossing oceans, ensuring that no corner of his flock feels neglected. His life is perpetual motion, not for himself, but for the millions he

Sometimes I think back to those afternoons of cricket, to the boy leaping in joy after bowling someone out. That same spirit of giving his all, of celebrating not himself but the game, has carried forward into his life as a leader. He does not play for his own victory, but for the collective triumph of

those he serves.

To me, what defines him most is not only his ability to keep the Dawoodi Bohra community united across continents, but the way he does it. He leads by example through humility, through service, through a willingness to bear the burdens of others as if they were his own. That is why he commands respect and immense love.

As I look back on the journey from our shared desk at school to his place today as the 53rd al-Dai al-Mutlaq, I feel both awe and gratitude. Awe at the magnitude of what he has achieved, and gratitude that I have been able to witness it as someone who once shared his childhood.

I feel deeply honored to connect with the Editor of Indo Gulf Times, Ahmar Bubere, and to share these reflections which have beautifully revived cherished memories of my childhood friendship and lifelong bond with Syedna Mufaddal

On my birthday, which falls on 11th October, I find myself reflecting with even greater gratitude on this bond of friendship and faith. And this year, a day later on 12th October, the community will celebrate the 82nd Birthday of Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin. To me, that nearness in dates feels like a personal blessing: a reminder that my own life's milestones are forever touched by his presence. On this occasion, I can only offer the simplest of prayers, born from the deepest of places: may Allah bless him with health, prosperity, and a long life, a hundred years and more, so that he may continue to spend his days with his followers, guiding them, uplifting them, and embodying the role of a true leader.

And as I write these words, I realise that for me, his story is more than just the story of a global spiritual leader. It is the story of a boy I once knew who grew into a man who now carries the hopes of millions. That journey, from the desk beside mine to the pulpit of the Dawat, is one of the great privileges of my life to have seen. ■

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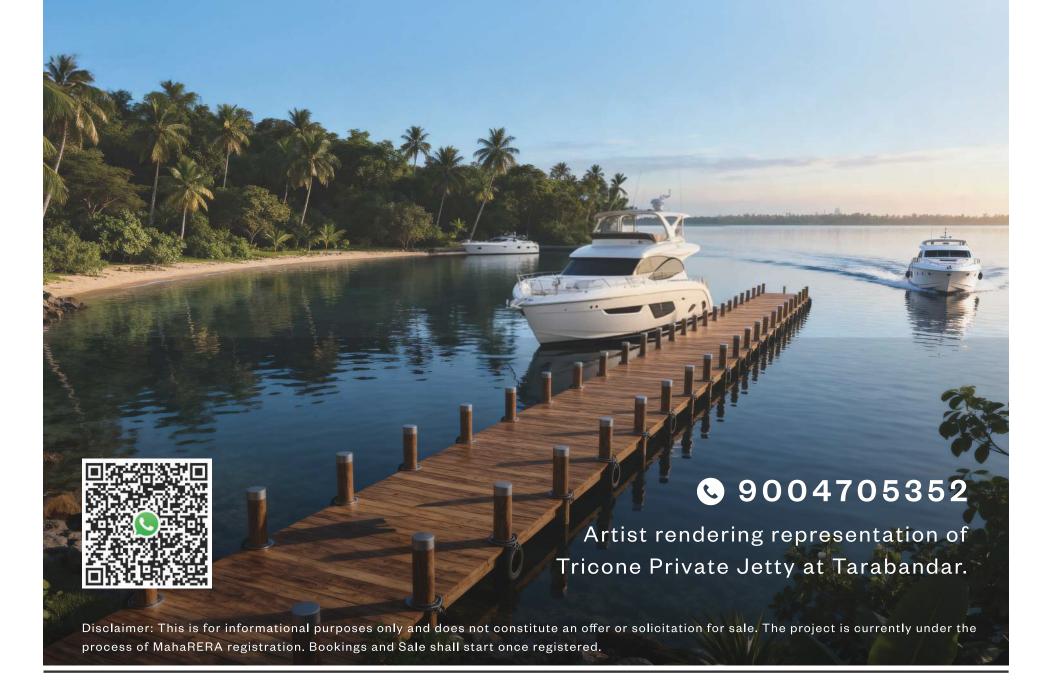
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Celebrating with a Smile: The Spirit of the 82nd Milad

Equally important to the Milad is the annual seminar known as Istifada Ilmiyya, held in Surat each year. 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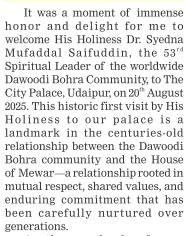


Bridging Centuries:

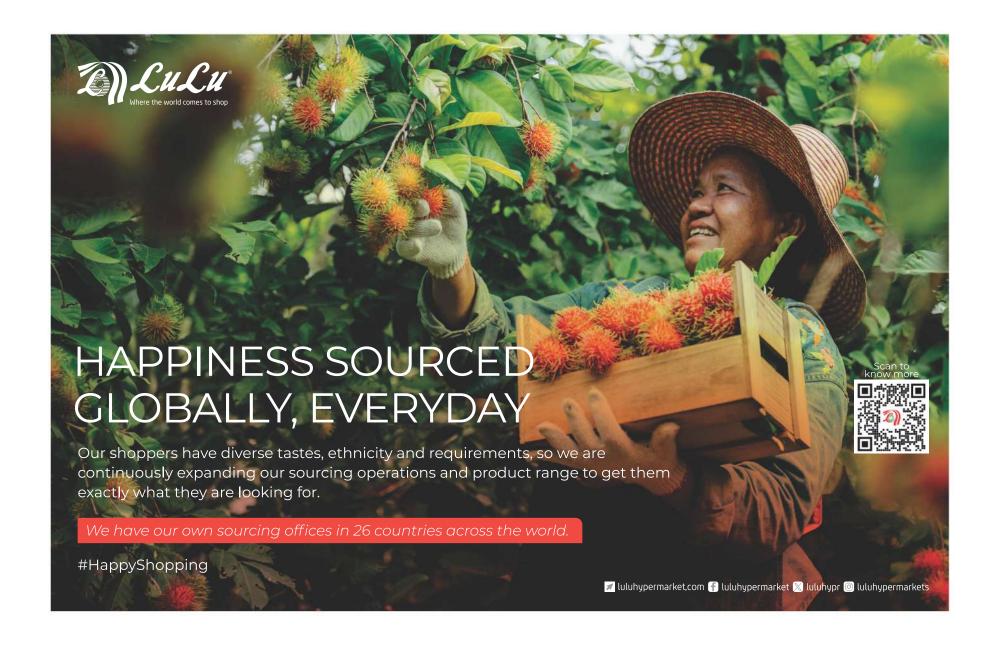

From Ruins to Radiance - Jami al- Anwar

During the period since, historians have observed the patronage of Fatimi imams towards architecture and art. They have left a great legacy of the treasures that are loved even today. These art and architecture manifest Dawats ideology and were built with the greatest caution; planning and construction of the monuments were taken care by the topmost ranking officials of the Dawat by direct supervision and direction of the Fatimi imam himself. Among all these monuments, the most important monument is the masjid of 16th Imam al Hakim bi Amr Allah called Al-Jami al-Anwar.

History Of Jami al-Anwar

Al Jami al - Anwar was constructed in the year 380/990–91 by Maulana al-Imam al-Aziz Billah^{AS}, further renovations and extensions were done in 393 / 1002 - 3, and final furnishings were completed in 403 / 1012-13 by his son Maulana al-Imam al-Hakim bi Amrillah^{AS}. It is one of the largest masjid in al-Qahira; it has over 1000 meters of Quranic inscriptions engraved in the walls of the main prayer hall. The masjid covers an area of 13,560 sq. meters, with a central courtvard occupying 5,000 sq. metres. It is also the oldest masjid in the world to have two minarets erected together at the time of its construction. It is revered as the Gem of Fatimi Cairo.

After the Seclusion of the 21st Imam Al-Tayyeb as many of the Egyptian rulers treated the legacy of the Fatimi Imam with bitterness and attempted to erase their reign of nearly 2 centuries. Their palaces were looted and destroyed, their schools were considered as places of atheism, and the mosques were left to fall into despair. Among all this, Jami al-Anwar faced many natural calamities. In 702/1303. during the mumluk period, there was an earthquake in the city of al-Qahira where the minaras of the mosque fell on the ground.

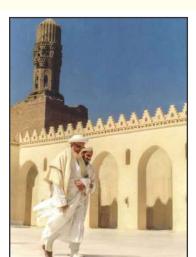
Over the course of history, the mosque was often neglected and was used for other purposes, eventually falling into ruins where large pieces of granite and old fragments of shape wood were spread across the courtyard. Over the time the masjid was used as a prison for captured Latin crusaders during the Crusades, as a stable by Salah adDin Yusuf ibn Ayyub, as a fortress by Napoleon I, as an Islamic arts Museum in 1890, and as a boys school in the 20th century during Gamal Abdel Nasser's presidency. Restoration of Jami al-Anwar

In 1356 / 1937, the first Dai to visited Jami al-Anwar was His Holiness 51st Dai Dr. Syedna Taher Saifuddin^{RA} during his visit to the mosque he expressed his heartache at the condition of the mosque and convevd his desire to restore the mosque. In 1398/1978 His Holiness Dr. Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA} respecting his father's wishes laid the foundation for restoring the mosque, bringing it back into the light. The restoration of Jami al-Anwar was the biggest movement for the conservation of the Fatimi monuments where 100 of

archaeological teams from different backgrounds were in Egypt during that time. The experts and craftsmen largely came from India while material was imported from around the world. In 1398/1978 Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA} stayed a month long in al-Qahira at the time of the inauguration of Sayyidah Zainab^{AS}

Zarih Mubarak. While Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA} and Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} were waiting to board their flight to Kuwait, Syedna Saifuddin^{TUS} who was aware of his father's wishes sought permission to stay back and start the first step in restoration of Jami al-Anwar which was the cleaning of the mosque. The next day, Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} with a group of people from the community went to Jami al-Anwar with small baskets, wheelbarrows. brooms and dustpans, where Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin TUS himself started cleaning the area near the mehraab. Along with waste and dirt, the mehraab itself was converted into a latrine of sorts. On the first day itself, they realized that the state of the mosque is far worse than they imagined; what was initially thought to be hopeless

slowly showed signs of progress. The following day when Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} returned to the mosque, they found a new pile of rubbish in places they had cleaned before; when the caretakers were questioned, he took Svedna Mufaddal Saifuddin TUS and his group

to a location behind the mehraab where stood an old building with 40 families living there; due to not having proper sanitation in the building, the residents went up to the roof of the building where they distributed their rubbish and emptied their bowels, which was very close to the mehraab. Since the majority of the masjid was unroofed, people would cross over and relieve themselves on the sacred verse of the Holy Quran and the masjid floors, but with Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin TU determination the pit was removed in a short amount of time.

Day after day, Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} and his group went for sweeping and cleaning of the mosque, which was motivated by Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA} desire to purify the masjid. This first step of cleaning the masjid was seen as impossible by some, setting the stage for the entire project. The restoration commenced with a series of acts in which dedication towards the Fatimi Imam AS and his representative Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA} brought an atmosphere of calm that resolved even the most difficult of obstacles.

Throughout the duration of the restoration, Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin TUS had instructed volunteers to recite The Holy Quran around and in the mosque premises. Prayers to Allah were their greatest weapon. The north minara of the

mosque was unaccessible for years but under the Guidance of Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin TUS it was reopened and cleaned in a very short amount of time. During the course of restoration, a well which was found where Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin personally descended to assist its reconstruction and was determined to make it operable, the well was considered auspicious since it provided water to the heavy construction site which was plagued by water scarcity. Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} personally inspected the work on site and interacted with the workmen.

On 4th Rabi al-Akhar 1416/ 29th August 1995 Syedna Mohammed Buhanuddin^{RA} delivered a sermon on the Milad of 21st Imam during the inauguration of al-Jami al-Juyushi, during the sermon he praised Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} for this efforts in restoration of Jami al-Anwar:

"In Kitab al-Tahara, Svedna al-Qadi al-Nu'man^{RA} narrates an incident in which RasulAllah^{SAW} was informed that a man had expectorated on the mehraab wall of the masjid. Learning of this, the man's wife cleaned the spoiled area. and perfumed it with saffron. Her actions delighted RasulAllah^{SAW} and he rewarded her with the saffron and musk of his prayers in her favour.

There was at one time, a persistent stench around the mehraab of al-Jami al-Anwar. Such was the sorry state of affairs that refuse was dumped in the Jami and its doorway had been turned into a tip; rubbish was dumped there. After the inauguration of Maulatona Zainab's^{AS} zarih mubarak, I travelled to Kuwait. At that time, I instructed my son, delight of my eye, Mufaddal Saifuddin to stay back in al-Qahira. "Remain here and begin the process of cleaning al-Jami al-Anwar". He personally engaged in the removal of refuse and sought to determine where the stench near the mehraab originated from.

Then one individual offered to show them its source. He led those present to a wikala immediately behind the mehraab and gibla where 40 families were residing. A pit had been created behind the mehraab wall into which these residents relieved themselves and threw their garbage. The open pit, full of ordure, filth and waste, was so disgusting and its stench so foul that it was almost impossible to stand there. Despite efforts made from morning till evening, workers who were willing to clean it could not be found. Then my son, Mufaddal, expressed his resolve to the volunteers around him. "I will descend into the pit and clean it myself. It has been a grave sin on our part that we were oblivious for so long about the mehraab being desecrated in this manner:" Immediately after he had expressed this intention, workers ready to clean the nearly three metre deep pit came forth and the area was cleared and made fragrant with incense. The marks of oppression upon al-Jami al-Anwar began fading from that day onwards.

Today, I pray for all those who rendered khidmat, and for my son; RasulAllah^{SAW} prayed for that woman, "May Allah bless her:" So today, I pray that may Allah reward him for his endeavours for he has strived to serve these Jami' masiids and toiled for their causes."

Syedna Mohammed $Burhanuddin^{\tiny RA} was\, determined\, that$ the inauguration of the restored masjid should coincide with the completion of 1400 years of Islamic calendar, the onset of the year 1401H. Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin, who was his father's Representative in al-Qahira, met every challenge during the restoration of Jami al-Anwar with wisdom, humility and conviction. Svedna Mufaddal Saifuddin's dedication to revive and restore Jami al-Anwar was noticeable and radiant to all.

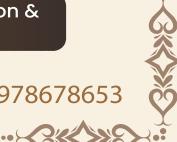


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Trust and Faith – The Cornerstones of the Dawoodi Bohra Ethos

Whereas before, faith and religion formed an integral part of lives, it has now become more of a question of convenience. an old-fashioned value, but for the Dawoodi Bohras, it has always been the very essence of one's existence. helping to steer course of life, making every obstacle bearable, every adversity manageable while striving for betterment in this world and the world hereafter.

The need to trust is innate in every human being, worldwide, whereby individuals find different doctrines, creeds or leaders to place their faith in. The Bohras are firm believers that Islam enables and constitutes a full development of the personality in terms of devotional practices, its religious injunctions and its ethical and behavioural principles. This assured leadership has united the Dawoodi Bohras, providing them with a sense of direction, a strong sense of culture and tradition, trust, and a sense of belonging to a faith and an integrated community, which has been a key strength throughout their history.

The $51^{\rm s}$ al-Dai al-Mutlaq Syedna Taher Saifuddin Aled the community through the first half of the $20^{\rm th}$ century. An accomplished scholar, a prolific writer and poet, a skilful administrator and a man of vision, he revitalised the community, fostered strong faith, modernised the organisation of the Dawat (supreme

office), promoted welfare and education in the community and guided it sagaciously through the tumultuous period of world wars and independence of nations.

It is to this historic office of al-Dai al-Mutlaq Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin $^{\rm RA}$, the $52^{\rm nd}$ incumbent was appointed in 1385/1965 and continued the efflorescence in the Bohra's sense of purpose and dedication based upon the belief in one deity, Allah, in the Qura'n as the Word of Allah, and in the sacred mission of Prophet Mohammed^{SAW} and others before him, and their successors, the imams. The 52nd al-Dai al-Mutlaq guided the Bohras with profound love and wisdom for five decades, becoming a guiding beacon of light in every aspect of life for countless Bohras.

As one sun set, another rose, following the sad demise of 52nd al-Dai al-Mutlaq Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA} on 17 January 2014/16 Rabi al-Awwal 1435H. Ashara Mubaraka is a period from the 2nd to the 10th of Moharram, the first month of the Islamic calendar dedicated to remembering the Prophet Mohammed, his grandson Imam Husain and his family, and their valiant stand for the universal values of justice, truth and humanity. For the Dawoodi Bohras, attending the Moharram congregations is a spiritual and

educational journey of growth and development, exemplified by the deeds of the seventy-two martyrs who sacrificed their lives on Youm-e Ashura, the 10th of Moharram 61H (680 AD), for a just cause.

The Bohra community, under the guidance and leadership of the 53rd al-Dai al-Mutlaq, Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS}, like his predecessors, dedicates these learning sessions to reinvigorating their faith as they navigate the complexities of modern life. The sermons inspire them to seek knowledge in the light of the Holy Quran and to strive to emulate the noble qualities of the Prophet

Mohammed and his family members.
Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} is blessed with the qualities of his

predecessors. He bears the same laqab (title), Saifuddin, as his celebrated grandfather, who was also the one who named him 'Aali Qadr Mufaddal ', or 'Mufaddal of lofty stature', foretelling the greatness he was destined to achieve all those years ago. Syedna Saifuddin $^{\mbox{\tiny TUS}}$ has inherited the wisdom and mannerisms of his beloved father, Syedna Burhanuddin^{RA}, abundantly visible in all aspects of his demeanour. Assiduous and devoted, he was relied upon by his illustrious father in implementing the initiatives closest to his heart.

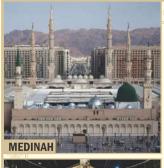

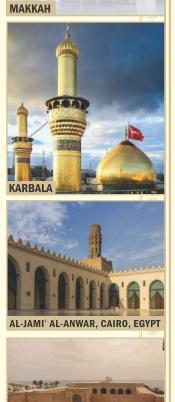

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Celestial Scribe: Qualities of a Quintessential Kaatib

Introduction

Across civilizations, from the banks of the Nile to the courts of Mesopotamia, the figure of the scribe has carried profound significance. Far from being mere calligraphists, scribes represented the intellectual elite, often trained for years in reading, writing, and interpreting sacred and administrative texts. with precision and wisdom. They anticipate the intent of their predecessors and act without explicit instruction— qualities that define the most trusted of scribes.

Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}: The Astute Kaatib

Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA} embodied this noble station throughout his life. From his youth, his perceptiveness and ability to intuit his predecessor's intentions set him apart. When

Though he and his entourage did not believe in zivarat. the sanctity of Syedna Hatim's RA qubba mubaraka moved them so deeply that they recited fatiha at his qabr. When Syedna Burhanuddin^{RA} emerged from his residence to meet the official, the dignitary hastened forward himself—a symbolic act of

reverence—before accompanying him to the gubba. In his public address, he repeatedly referred to Syedna Burhanuddin^{RA} as a father figure, affirming his spiritual authority.

Such recognition was a blow to adversaries in Yemen, who had schemed to curtail Syedna's visit by falsely reporting unrest to the authorities. Instead, officials found peace and devotion wherever Syedna went, compelling them to withdraw their objections. Syedna Burhanuddin^{RA} thus fulfilled his intention of performing forty ziyarats, an outcome that reflected his deep alignment with his predecessor's vision.

The Language of Implicit Meaning

The role of the Kaatib lies as much in reading between the lines as in recording words. Mumineen throughout history have displayed this same sensibility, discerning the deeper intent in the blessed directives of Duat Mutlageen^{RA}. Syedna Taher Saifuddin's RA statement, "Take bhai Burhanuddin, for wealth resides beneath his feet," exemplifies this. At face value, it was a simple remark, but Mumineen understood it as profound counsel. They welcomed Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA} into their homes, their businesses, and their lives, confident that his presence was a source of both spiritual and material prosperity.

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The implicit wisdom embedded in such expressions is a hallmark of divine guidance. A faithful Mumin, like a seasoned scribe, learns to perceive not just words but intent—living by the subtle direction contained within the ishaaraat (intimation) of WaliAllah^{AS}.

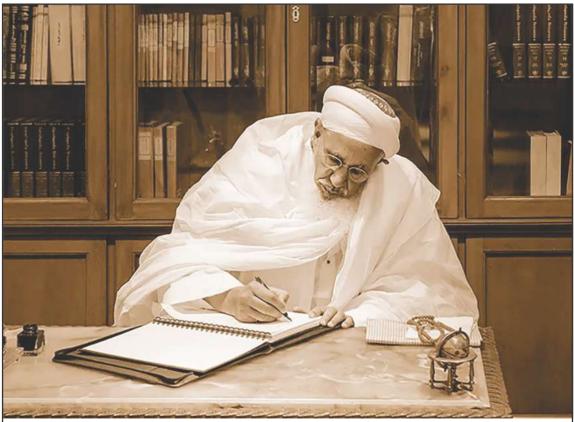
'Utaarid and the Shams: The Dai and the Imam

Astronomers often note that Mercury is difficult to observe, as its nearness to the Sun conceals it within the Sun's glare. Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} reimagined this phenomenon: 'Utaarid, he explained, chooses to bask in the Sun's brilliance, absorbing its radiance until it becomes indistinguishable from it. The planet's identity is defined by its closeness to the Sun.

In the same way, the Dai attributes all his radiance and authority to the Imam. To look upon the Dai is to see the Imam's light reflected purely and without obstruction. Syedna Burhanuddin^{RA} expressed this truth in Madras five decades ago, stating that it is through the Dai that Mumineen behold the Imam. Poets echoed this sentiment when Syedna Taher Saifuddin^{RA} visited Cairo, and scholars in the Maghreb, witnessing Syedna Burhanuddin^{RA} walking amid Fatimi Asaar, declared that he bore the same luminous presence as Imam al-Mu'izz^{AS}

Mumineen as Reflections of the Dai

Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} graciously extended this analogy to all Mumineen. Just as the Dai is 'Utaarid to the Imam's Sun, so too are Mumineen 'Utaarid to the Dai. Their actions, speech, and conduct should mirror the teachings of their

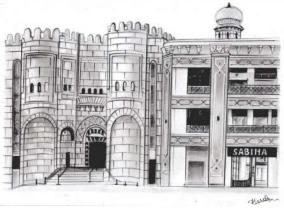






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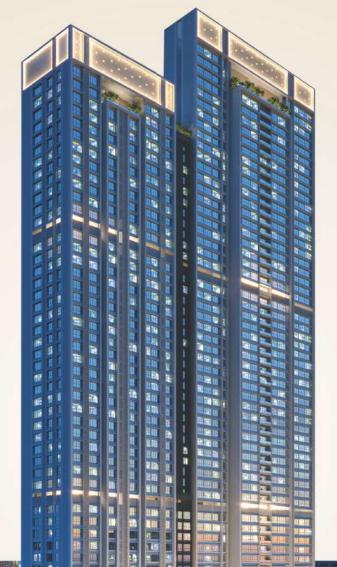


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The Vibrance of Divine Aura

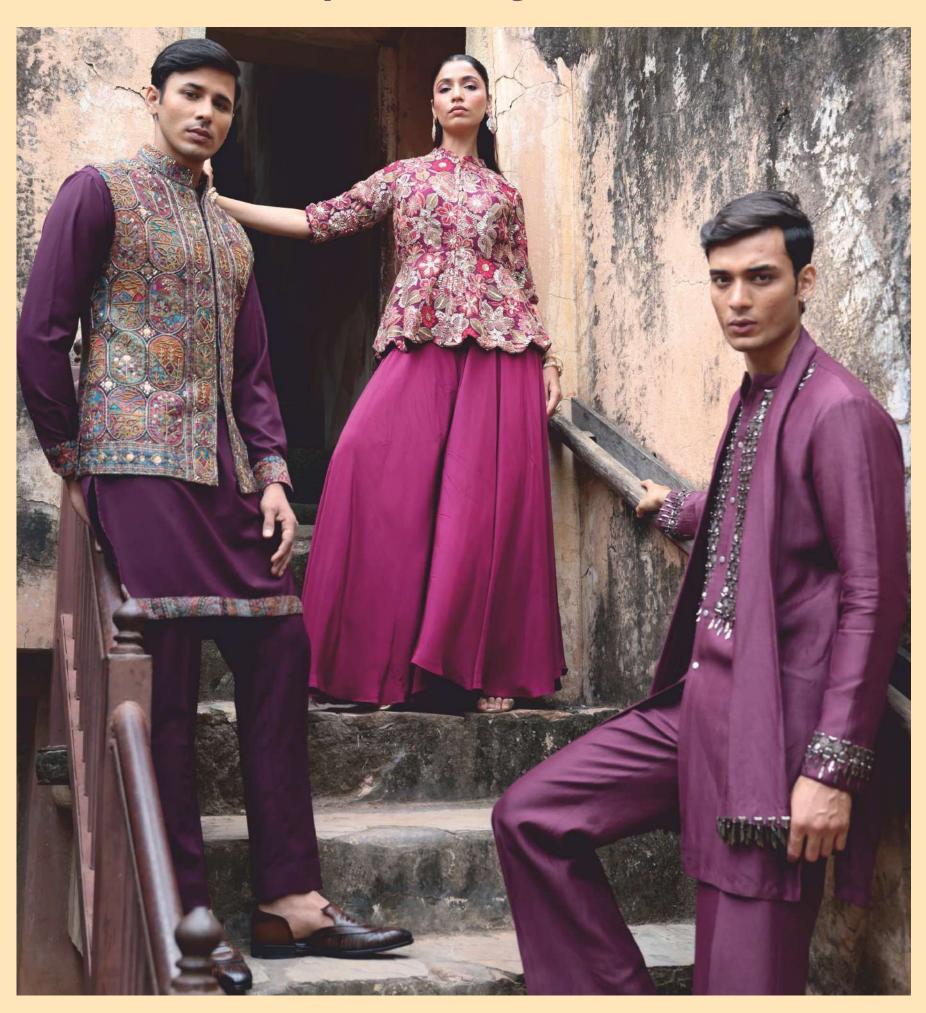

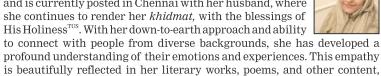

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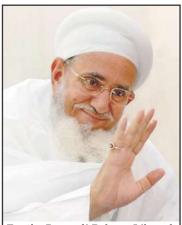
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In Thread and Tradition: How the Bohra Dress Code weaves a Tapestry of Unity under the Dai al Mutlaq

For many, a birthday is a moment of joy, a day to celebrate a life. For our community, the 12th of October is that day and so much more. This year, as we celebrate the 82nd Milad Mubarak of His Holiness Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} and the 115th Zikra Milad of his revered father, His Holiness Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}, we don't just mark a date. We renew our faith and reflect on the devotion that shapes our lives.

Looking back, my years at Aljamea-tus-Saifiyah are not counted in textbooks or exams. They are measured in moments: the slow rhythm of recitation, the way words of du'a took root in my chest, and the days when faith stopped being something taught and became something lived. Seven years in Jamea were enough to set me on a course where prayer became more than repetition—it became presence, attention, and love.

Living in America has often tested that resolve. Faith is rarely a common language here. To pray with intensity, to speak of Husain with tears, to shape my days around deen rather than convenience—all this has felt, at times, like swimming upstream. Yet, every year, as the month of Muharram arrives, something changes.

The days of 'Ashara Mubaraka bring back the vitality of those Jamea years. They remind me that faith

doesn't depend on environment; it depends on the heart. By the tenth day, as our Maula, al-Dai al-Ajal Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS}, bows in sajda, the force of his grief reverberates through me. My tears return, not as weakness but as renewal. They are a covenant that wherever I live, I remain bound by love.

In our tradition, tears are not simply the overflow of sorrow. They are adornments of the soul, ornaments more lasting than gold. Centuries ago, Fatimi artisans embodied this truth. In their goldwork, teardrop motifs appeared again and again. One such bead, now housed in the Metropolitan Museum of Art, carries six teardrop-shaped petals,

each one a miniature echo of grief. In our Fatimi heritage, these represent the tears shed for Husain, the droplets of sorrow that polish the soul into purity.

Ashara transforms me in the same way. Each tear I shed becomes a granule of gold, reshaping my heart into something more resilient, more tender, and more capable of seeing others with mercy. Just as Fatimi goldsmiths cut and joined edges to form spheres that defied convention, my faith is reforged each Muharram-not through conventional ease but through the labor of remembrance, through grief that makes me whole.

And then comes Milad Mubarak. The birth of our Maula

is not just a date on a calendar but the flowering of this very love. It is a day where sorrow and joy meet: the remembrance of Husain's sacrifice, which humbles us, joined with the celebration of Maula's birth, which lifts us. Together, they weave grief into hope, and hope into action.

The love I feel for him is not abstract. It is concrete, visible in how I choose to live: to serve when I can, to soften when anger beckons, to believe that even in a world that often seems indifferent to faith, it still has the power to create communities of care.

This is why the art of tears matters so much. Just as a Fatimi bead is both fragile and enduring, so too is the human heart. It is tears—polished, shed, shared that strengthen it. Today, under the guidance of Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS}, we live that truth collectively. Each Ashara, each Milad, becomes not only a commemoration but a renewal.

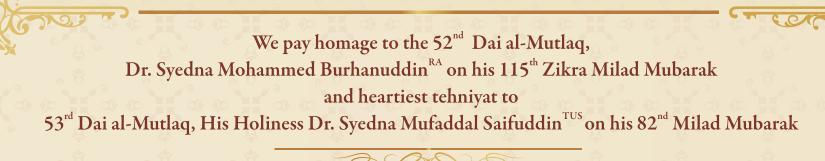
Faith is not finished in one act or one year. Like the patient strokes of a craftsman, it is shaped slowly, with repetition, with intention, with love. Every tear adds to that work. In addition to Sailana, Sheopur Kalan, and Kota, Syedna also made







brief stopovers in Ratlam and Indore. Across each town, his visits reinforce enduring values of faith, gratitude, service, and social responsibility, distinguishing his leadership and care for the Dawoodi Bohra community's spiritual and social well-being.

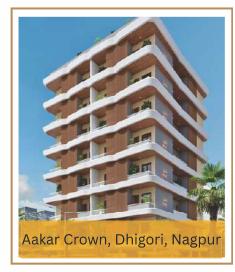

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How Surat Became the Spiritual and Intellectual Heart of the International Dawoodi Bohra Community

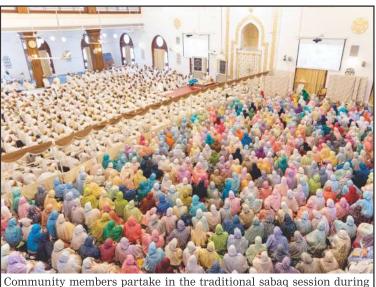

The name Surat usually evokes a rush of sensory details: the sparkle of diamonds, the soft glide of silk, and the deep, constant beat of commerce. But tucked away from the bustling marketplaces and cutting ateliers, this city holds a different, quieter kind of brilliance. This light doesn't come from a forge or a loom; it shines from the heart of a tradition, nurtured for over two centuries by a community whose passion for scholarship is every bit as fierce as its skill in business.

The human story of this legacy begins in the early 19th century. A visionary leader saw that for his people to truly thrive, education couldn't be a sideline—it had to be the main event. In 1810, right beside his own home, he planted the seed for a learning centre, which would eventually be called Darse Saifee. It was an act of profound commitment, showing a belief passed down through generations: that seeking knowledge is a spiritual necessity, and that a good library is as sacred as the house of worship next door.

This first academy was built not just with stone, but with values. Taking inspiration from

the great Islamic centres like Al-Azhar in Cairo, Darse Saifee offered more than just lectures. It offered a home, a sense of dignity, and a tough, honest intellectual ethic. Students didn't just memorize texts; they lived, ate, and breathed within the rhythm of an institution where learning was absorbed through presence and conversation as much as from books. This wasn't about simply

producing graduates; it was about shaping thoughtful, whole people-the scholar as both a student of life and a servant of knowledge.

Over time, that modest beginning flowered into Aljameatus-Saifivah, a world-class institution. Through the guidance of successive leaders, the academy grew, embracing modern subjects like science, English, and

philosophy. These were not viewed as external compromises, but as essential tools for navigating the modern world. Here, the wisdom of the past and the realities of the present don't fight; they hold a genuine, necessary conversation.

But what truly makes this tradition feel human is the sense of knowledge as a continuous, living gift, passed hand to hand, from one heart to the next. You can see this most clearly in Istifada Ilmiyah, a unique intellectual pilgrimage that, since 2017, sees thousands of community members descend on Surat each year. For two weeks, the city becomes less like a destination and more like a spiritual workshop, buzzing with an energy that is immersive and intensely focused.

The people who come are the essence of the story. They are not forced attendees, but attorneys from the USA and the UK, cybersecurity experts from Australia and the Far East, teachers from Africa and the Middle East, and homemakers from around the globe-all arriving with their own personal hunger for understanding. A lawyer finds clarity for her practice in a session on business ethics; a cyber expert connects

ancient moral responsibility to the dizzying complexity of digital security. In these moments, Surat is transformed from a city of fixed boundaries into a boundless atmosphere where the generations connect, and tradition finds its fresh, vibrant relevance in every corner of contemporary life.

During this time, the transformation in the old quarters is palpable. Zampa Bazaar doesn't just buzz with selling: it hums with deep conversation. Within the gates of the academy, elders and students are not merely performing rituals; they are participating in a continuous, shared act of learning that seamlessly links the past to the

For the Dawoodi Bohra community, this tradition is more than heritage—it is a way of being. Education is not treated as a separate pursuit, but as something deeply woven into the fabric of everyday life. And as community members carry this ethos from Surat to cities and towns across the world, the legacy continues—not in the form of monuments or accolades, but in the clarity of purpose, depth of understanding, and quiet conviction they bring into their lives, wherever they may be.

CELEBRATIONS OF SYEDNA MUFADDAL SAIFUDDIN'S MILAD

Connecting to spirituality

For forty days from the Milad of Prophet Mohammed^{SAW} to the Milad celebrations of Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin $^{\text{\tiny TUS}}$, Dawoodi Bohras worldwide engage in prayers, charitable initiatives, and recitations of the Quran and various nasheeds. Homes, mosques, and community halls are illuminated with lights, floral decorations, and banners expressing their love for the Prophet Mohammed^{SAW}, his son Imam Tayyib^{AS} and their spiritual representative Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS}

The centrepiece of the celebration is the Milad Waaz that is delivered by Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS}. This sermon is also the culmination of the Istefada Ilmiyah, the annual knowledge fair held as an extension of Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin's Milad celebrations. This imparting of knowledge and engagement in learning and skill-based training is the true continuance of the spiritual legacy of the Fatemi Era.

Acts of Community and

In keeping with the Islamic principle that celebrations should benefit society, the Milad Mubarak is marked by acts of charity and

community welfare. Community members are provided with assistance for housing, education, medical and economic upliftment. Precautionary medical testing and cancer awareness is also a big part of these celebrations.

Expressions of Joy

The day of Milad world over is marked with processions, festive meals, and cultural programs that fill the atmosphere with joy. Children dress in colorful attire, families exchange sweets, and gatherings resound with chants of "Maula Mubarak". Across the globe the Dawoodi Bohra mosques and community centers host large feasts where thousands partake together, reinforcing the Islamic ethos of unity.

Celebrations in Fatemi Cairo

During the Fatimi Era (909–1171 CE), Cairo was not only a political capital but also a center of

spiritual and cultural grandeur. The Fatimi Aimmat integrated religious and spiritual activities with the commemorations of the Prophet and the Ahl al-Bayt

Historical sources record that the following Milad were celebrated annually during the Fatemi Era:

The Milad of Prophet Mohammed^{SAV}

The Milad of Imam $\mathrm{Ali}^{\scriptscriptstyle{\mathrm{AS}}}$ The Milad of Maulatona Fatema^{AS} The Milad of Imam Hasan^{AS} The Milad of Imam Husain $^{\mathrm{AS}}$

The Milad of the current Imam The historian al-Maqrizi (d. 1442), in his historical account al-Khitat, describes how on these occasions "the streets of Cairo were illuminated, and sweets, honey, and bread was distributed among the people." He notes that the celebrations drew the elite and the commons, transforming Cairo into a city of festivity.

Similarly, Syedna Idris Imaduddin (d. 1468) in his book 'Uyūn al-Akhbār highlights that these birthdays were not merely social events but deeply spiritual gatherings, where educational sermons were delivered in the mosques and praises were sung in honor of the Prophet and Ahlal-Bayt.

Fatimi Literature as a from of celebration

The poet Ibn Hani al-Andalusi, attached to the court of Imam al-Moiz li-Dīnillah^{AS}, played a central role in shaping the celebratory culture. His qasaid exalted the Prophet^{SAW} and the Aimmmat^{AS}, often recited during public festivities and private court gatherings.

In one of his celebrated lines, he declares:

بِكُم تُرفَعُ أَعلامُ الهُدى، وَبِكُم يُستَضاءُ سُبُلُ الرَّشاد، وَبِكُم يُعتَصنَمُ الكِتابُ، وَبِكُم يُتَفَسَّرُ قُر و ضُ اللهِ، وَ أَحكامُهُ، وَ حَلالُهُ، وَ حَر امُهُ

"Through you [the Imams], the banners of guidance are raised high, and through your light, the paths of truth are made clear."

Such verses not only praised the Imam but also sacralised the very act of celebration. Just as Dawoodi Bohras today recite gasidas glorifying the Dai and the Imam, Fatimi Cairo resounded with the poetic praise of the Imams, blending devotion with literature.

COMPARING THE TRADITIONS

When viewed through the prism of Fatemi continuance, several striking parallels emerge between the Fatemi celebrations and the celebrations of the Milad Mubarak of Svedna Mufaddal Saifuddin:

Spiritual Leadership

The celebrations of the Milad al Nabi and the celebrations of the Milad of the Aimmat during the Fatemi Era were a show of devotion and acceptance of the position of the Prophet^{SAW} and the Imam^{AS}. Similarly, the Milad celebrations of the Duat and the current Dai al Mutlaq Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin $^{\text{\tiny TUS}}$ are also show of devotion and loyalty towards the Dai and the Imam.

Community Feasting and Charity:

The tradition of providing food is a spiritual act that finds its origins in the Quran.

إِنَّمَا نُطْعِمُكُمْ لِوَجْهِ ٱللَّهِ لَا نُرِيدُ مِنكُمْ جَزَامٌ وَلَا شُكُورًا

We feed you for the sake of Allah and we do not expect from you any recompense or any thanks.

Thus, the tradition of providing meals is an act of deep spirituality rooted in the verses of the Quran and the hadith of the Prophet^{SAW}.

Poetry and Praise

From Ibn Hani to Syedi Abdeali Imaduddin, the tradition of writing and reciting qasaid in the praise of the Imam and the Dai has been a way of displaying devotion towards the $Awliyaullah^{AS}$. It reaffirms the faith of the believer in the continuance of spiritual leadership from the Prophet^{SAW} to the Aimmat^{AS}, through the Dai al Mutlaq TU

Thus, the Milad Mubarak of Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} is more than just a birthday celebration—it is a living continuation of the Fatemi tradition and also a way to honour the previous Dai Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin whose birthday has been chosen as the day to celebrate the Milad of his successor too.

By linking celebration with charity, devotion with poetry, and festivity with unity, these celebrations affirm a timeless truth: that the remembrance of Awliyaullah^{AS}—be it the Prophet, the Aimmat, or their spiritual successors, the Duat Mutlageen— infuses the lives of the believers with radiance, purpose, and devotion. Thus, the Milad Mubarak of Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin is not only a tribute to his person but also a reaffirmation of the enduring Fatemi spirit that traces back to the Prophet Mohammed^{SAW}himself.■

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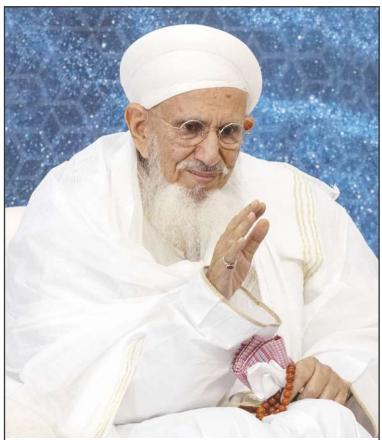
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A Milad Reflection: Reconciliation in the Heavens

Where Faith Meets Frontiers: The Dawoodi Bohras of Dar es Salaam

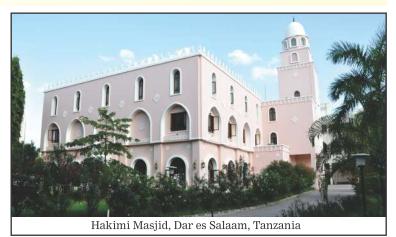


With blessings and vision, His Holiness Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin uplifts Dar es Salaam's Dawoodi Bohras.

Across centuries and seas, through memories anchored in devotion and horizons painted with promise, the Dawoodi Bohras of Dar es Salaam carry with them a story that is at once ancient and alive. It is a narrative of faith carried across waters, of people who shaped new worlds without ever losing sight of their origins, and of a community that quietly became part of the beating heart of East Africa.

The first strands of this journey trace back to the brilliance of the Fatimid era in the 10th and 11th centuries, when Imams from the lineage of Fatima, daughter of the Prophet Muhammad, fostered a society lit by knowledge, artistry, and vision. Institutions such as Cairo's Al-Azhar University still whisper the echoes of that time. As history shifted, the Bohra community found continuity through the office of the Da'i al-Mutlaq, established in Yemen in the 12th century to guide the faithful during the Imam's seclusion. It was this structure of leadership that gave the community a steady course across an uncertain world, anchoring them through the passing centuries.

From Yemen, that current of belief found its way to Gujarat,



where the seat of the community moved in harmony with the tides of history-from Ahmedabad to Jamnagar, Ujjain to Burhanpur, Surat before finally arriving in Mumbai. Through these shifting landscapes, the Bohras stayed bound by their faith, their pursuit of knowledge, and their ethic of service. Today, the 53rd Da'i al-Mutlag, His Holiness Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin, stands as their spiritual guide, leading his followers with warmth, vision, and a deep humanity that touches every aspect of their lives.

The 19th century opened another horizon as the Indian Ocean became a passage of new beginnings. Among those who journeyed toward it was Sheikh Amiji Musaji of Kutch Mandvi, who arrived in Dar es Salaam in 1860 with Sultan Sayed Majid of Zanzibar. What he brought with him was not only the spirit of trade but the spirit of prayer, embodied in one of the city's first mosques—a space that became more than stone and mortar, evolving into a sanctuary of connection for generations who followed.

From those seeds has grown a community that now numbers nearly over a thousand families.

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In 2016, Syedna selected Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, as the venue for the Ashara Mubaraka gathering. In this historic event, over 30,000 Dawoodi Bohras attended the event making it the largest ever international gathering to have taken place in Tanzania.

Today, their lives contribute in ways both visible and unseen: in the shops where hardware is traded and houses built, in the offices of lawyers and accountants, in the quiet care of doctors and pharmacists, and across schools and hospitals where knowledge and healing are shared. In every corner of civic life, from industry to education, they have woven themselves into the city's fabric, strengthening it with presence and participation.

Yet to speak of them only in terms of business is to miss their essence. Service has always been the quieter pulse of their tradition. The Dawoodi Bohras have carried their ethic of welfare into schools. clinics, and social programs that extend far beyond their own community. These efforts-offered without fanfare—have built ties of

His Holiness Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin, the 52nd Dai al-Mutlag, visited Dar es Salaam numerous times during his lifetime, and His Holiness Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin, the 53rd Dai al-Mutlaq, has continued this legacy by visiting the city and showering blessings upon the community in the same way.

It was during Ashara Mubaraka in 2016 that this bond with Dar es Salaam found its fullest expression For ten days, over thirty thousand Dawoodi Bohras from every corner of the globe gathered in devotion. Streets filled with chants of prayer, homes

opened in hospitality, and mosques became luminous with remembrance. More than a ritual, it was a profound moment of belonging, one in which the city itself seemed to breathe in rhythm with the gathering. His Holiness Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin, present among his followers, also met the President of Tanzania, deepening the community's connection with the nation that had embraced them. That memory lingers with pride, and now, the Bohras of Dar es Salaam look forward again, longing to host Ashara Mubaraka once more and to welcome their beloved leader into the soul of Africa.

Their journey has not been untouched by trial. Politics have shifted, societies have transformed, and the tides of change have at times seemed unkind. Yet through humility, unity, and an enduring

And so, their story continues-neither a tale of survival nor of exile, but one of presence, contribution, and meaning. It is written in faith carried across waters, in work that enriches the city around them, in service that stretches beyond borders of creed or kinship. And as they await with hope the return of their beloved leader, His Holiness Svedna Mufaddal Saifuddin, they affirm once more that Dar es Salaam is not only their home but also their horizon where faith and frontier continue to meet with quiet grace. ■



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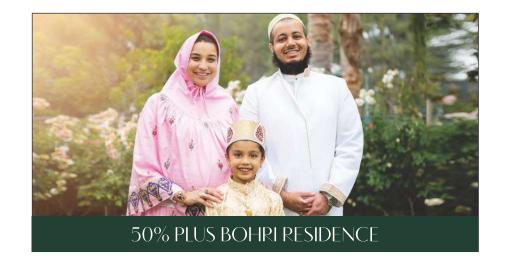




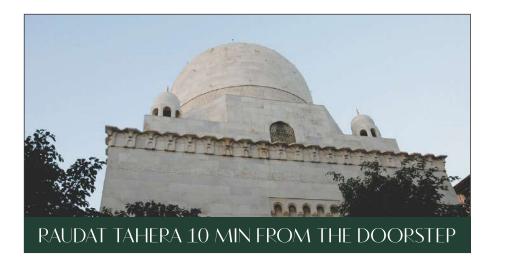


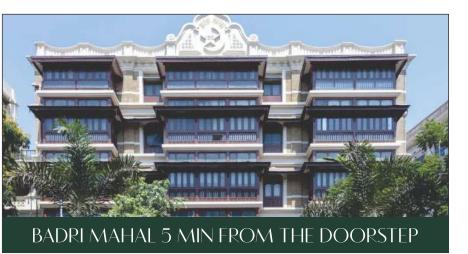

The night sky has long served as a source of guidance for humanity. The constellations, also known as zodiac signs, have long served as a silent map of creation, guiding sailors across oceans and wanderers through deserts. They are not random stars, but rather ordered constellations, each with a "taseer", or influence, that shapes the rhythm of life on Earth. However, as vast as the heavens appear, above the constellations and beyond the orbit of stars is a greater source of guidance: our Duat Mutlageen's brilliant legacy, personified by Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin $^{\text{RA}}$ and Syedna Aali Qadr Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS}.

Falak al-Buruj: buruj is the plural of burj, which means residence, fort, or tower contains the stars that ancient observers recognized as symbols and beings. Above it is al-Falak al-Muheet, a sphere that encompasses all celestial orbits. These massive layers of the universe were once thought to contain and regulate the effects of all creation. However, Imam and his Dai are even more powerful because they not only rise above their influence, but also channel and govern their taseer. Their counsel does not come from the stars; it compels them.

If Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA} gave us the stars to guide us, Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} guarantees that we will follow the path they illuminate. Burhanuddin AqaRA raised a generation, guiding them like the stable and enduring constellations of the night sky. Mufaddal Moula TUS, like the brilliant sunrise, puts that advice into action every day: practical, clear, and warm. In his presence, the wisdom of the heavens is no longer distant or abstract: it is a lived reality

As we mark the 82nd Milad Mubarak of Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} and the 115th Zikra Milad of Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}, we reflect not only on their lives but also on their place in the larger cosmos. They are our constellations, our rising sun, moonlight in the night of mourning, and the light of day on the path of service. They rise above al-Falak al-Buruj and al-Falak al-Muheet, beyond the reach of the stars, guiding our lives with clarity that no zodiac chart can match.

The heavens may shine brightly, but their significance is incomplete without Awliya Allah As, who interprets, directs, and perfects their structure. He gives the universe purpose and the stars meaning. And for us, his children, he is the true constellation, guiding, protecting, and illuminating our every step with lights that add true meaning to the skies above.

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Jamnagar's Dawoodi Bohras: Centuries of Faith, Institutions, and Enterprise

Jamnagar is a city known for its oil refineries, defence establishments, and, more recently, experiments with artificial intelligence. But for the Dawoodi Bohra community, Jamnagar holds a different significance altogether. Their presence here stretches back more than 400 years, entwined with stories of faith, survival, and enterprise that remain central to how the community sees itself

For a city that now counts roughly 1,680 Bohra households, 22 masjids, and three jamaats, Jamnagar is not just another settlement. It is a place where Bohra history intersects with Dawat history, where mosques and schools and hospitals were built layer by layer, and where moments of drought, revival, and devotion have shaped collective memory across generations.

Origins in Faith and

The Bohra connection with Jamnagar dates back to the time of Syedna Yusuf Najmuddin^{RA}, when he resided in Yemen. With his raza, Peer Sahab travelled to Saurashtra and settled in Jamnagar, establishing a foothold for the community. From that starting point, the presence of Bohras gradually spread across the region, rooting families in the soil of western India and tying Jamnagar into the spiritual geography of the Dawoodi Bohra story.

One of the defining episodes came generations later, during the era of Syedna Abdeali Saifuddin^{RA} Jamnagar faced a crippling drought and famine, which pushed thousands of families to desperation. His Holiness, whose qabr rests in Surat, intervened in a way that combined relief with long-term vision. Nearly 12,000 mumineen were summoned to Surat, where he provided them food and shelter for 11 months. But he went further: during that time, he trained them in trades, nurtured skills, and instilled habits of enterprise. When they returned to Jamnagar after the famine ended, they carried back not just survival, but sustainable livelihoods that secured their future.

That moment captures the dual character of Bohra life in Jamnagar: anchored in Dawat and spirituality, but always tied to resilience and enterprise.

A City Blessed by Four Duaat

Jamnagar's story is not only one of settlement, but also of sanctity. Four Duaat Mutlageen^{RA} have staved in this city, blessing its soil and its people. Their presence transformed Jamnagar into a place of spiritual pride and a landmark in Bohra history.

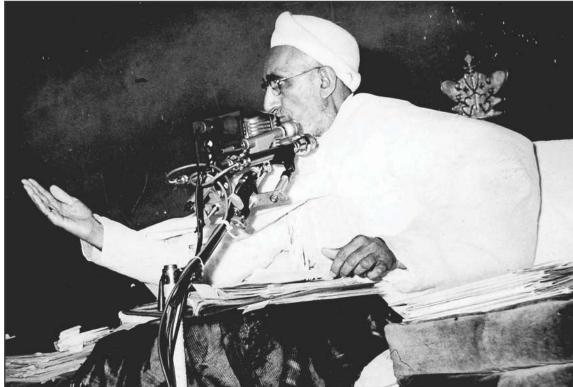

Saifee Masjid

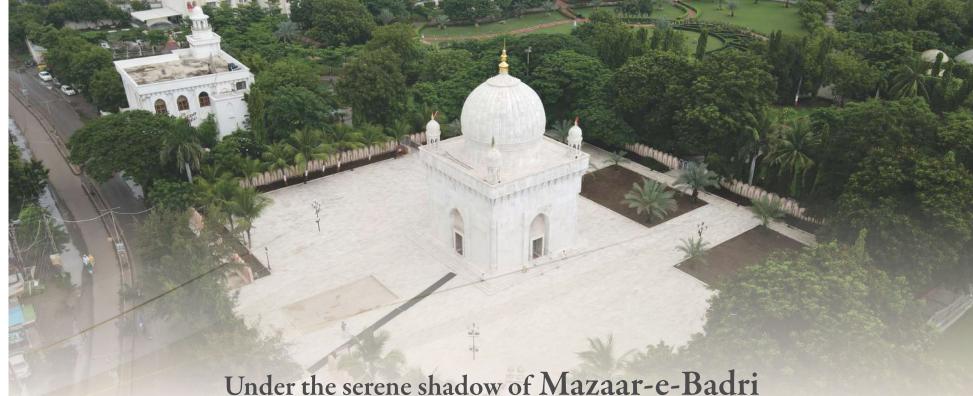

Institutions of Education and Healthcare

If the masjid anchors Jamnagar's soul, then institutions like Taheri English School shape its future. Founded in 1920, with its foundation stone laid on 20 April 1920 (2 Shaban al-Karim 1338), it was the city's first formal Bohra school. More than 105 years later, it continues to run at full capacity, upgraded with digital tools and modern classrooms, but faithful to its dual mission of academic excellence and religious grounding. Generations of professionals, from doctors to engineers, traders to teachers, trace their education to its halls.

Healthcare has been another cornerstone. Saifee Hospital has long served Jamnagar, treating both Bohras and people from across the city. Plans are underway for expansions and upgrades, reflecting rising demand. What began as a community initiative has grown into a civic resource, embodying the principle of service without boundaries.

Trade, Business, and Expo

Commerce remains a hallmark of Jamnagar's Bohras. From early trade networks, the community steadily moved into manufacturing, particularly brass fittings and tiles, industries now synonymous with the city's industrial base.

This entrepreneurial spirit was on display two years ago at the Saifee Burhani Expo, inaugurated by Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS}. Artisans, manufacturers, and traders exhibited side by side, demonstrating how tradition and innovation could coexist. The expo was not just a showcase but a

statement of how Bohra business continues to evolve while staying rooted in ethics and community.

Sites of Memory and Continuity

Alongside schools and businesses, Jamnagar holds Haveli Mubarak and other historic sites tied to Dawat. These places may not be landmarks in tourist itineraries, but for the community, they are living anchors, almost like markers of belonging, reminders of sacrifice, and quiet evidence of a

history that runs deep.

Organisation and Civic Life

Much of the community's everyday work is organised through the three jamaats of Jamnagar. Committees for education, welfare, and khidmat

operate quietly but effectively. Volunteers handle tasks ranging from food drives to repairing rooftops, arranging medical camps, or managing large-scale events.

As Mohammed Soni, a long-time community figure, puts it: "Our institutions are over a century old, but their spirit is always new. The balance between faith, service, and progress defines Jamnagar's Bohras." His words reflect a mindset that prefers action to rhetoric, a way of life shaped by khidmat.

A City and a Community

To the outside world, Jamnagar is an industrial city, tied to oil refineries and new technology. To its Bohras, it is also a city layered with history: a Peer's first settlement, a famine survived through the vision of Syedna Abdeali Saifuddin^{RA}, a Mazaar where Mohta Bava rests, a masjid that once hosted Ashara after centuries, and schools and hospitals that continue to serve generations.

The Dawoodi Bohras of Jamnagar do not frame their story around a single event. It is a cumulative narrative, built through steady commitments across centuries. From the founding of Taheri English School to the expansion of Saifee Hospital, from the preservation of Mazaare-Badri to the entrepreneurial rise of brass manufacturing, Jamnagar's Bohras have shown a pattern: build for endurance, sustain for the long term, and tie faith with service.

That is why, for the community, Jamnagar is more than home. It is history still alive, a story of faith and enterprise written in the steady work of generations. ■

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How Jamnagar Gave Birth to Rasm-e Saifee

In every faith, there are moments when age-old traditions evolve into something profoundly beautiful. For the Dawoodi Bohra community, one such moment began with a simple question: how can a sacred act like marriage remain accessible to all?

You see, marriage in Islam is an act of devotion, a joining not just of two people, but of purpose and faith. For generations, Bohra weddings reflected these virtues in moments that were meant to be intimate, graceful, yet were starting to become increasingly expensive.

Families, often driven by love and expectation, would go beyond their means to host celebrations worthy of the occasion. Over time, the joy of nikah sometimes came shadowed by worry.

It was in Jamnagar, a city that has long carried Dawat's presence within its walls, that a new idea took shape. During the time of Syedna Taher Saifuddin^{RA}, conversations began about how to bring ease into this essential ceremony for all community members from different walks of life. The intent was not to simplify faith, but to simplify the process around it. With his raza and guidance, Jamnagar's jamaat prepared a collective nikah, conducted together, with the blessings of His Holiness.

Those who were present at the first ceremony must remember how quick and wonderful it was. A few couples gathered in a courtyard. Families sat close together, listening to the recitation of nikah, each vow echoing in unison. There were no banners or loud orchestras. Only reverent joy, the kind that comes from doing something right. When the prayers ended, the elders turned to each other and realised they had witnessed the start of something larger than themselves.

Jamnagar, by then, was already an old chapter in the Bohra story.

The city's connection to Dawat went back centuries, to the time of Syedna Yusuf Najmuddin^{RA} in Yemen, when his envoy first laid the community's foundations in Saurashtra. Its people had known both hardship and service; none more telling than the episode when Syedna Abdeali Saifuddin^{RA} brought twelve thousand mumineen from famine-stricken Jamnagar to Surat, sheltered them for eleven months, and taught them trades so they could return home with dignity. That same instinct for collective care now guided the formation of what became known as Rasm-e Saifee.

As years passed, the practice grew. More couples joined, more jamaats adopted the system, and what began as a local act of convenience became a symbol of unity. Each Rasm was conducted with the same discipline of sacred vows, prayers, and shared simplicity. It captured the essence of Bohra life: faith intertwined with order, spirituality grounded in practicality.

When the idea reached other cities, it found fertile ground. Under Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}, Rasm-e Saifee became a global institution, formally structured under the International Taiseer-un-Nikah Committee. Under Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS}, it continues to flourish from Mumbai to Mombasa, from Karachi to Houston, each event carrying a trace of that first gathering in Jamnagar.

Even today, when hundreds of couples stand together beneath the same canopy, the spirit of that origin lingers. It is the same city, the same humility, the same belief that faith should make life lighter, not heavier. Rasm-e Saifee is no longer just a ceremony; it is a living reflection of what Dawat has always taught: that the simplest ideas, when born from compassion, can transform entire generations.

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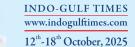
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Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}-Giving Me Purpose

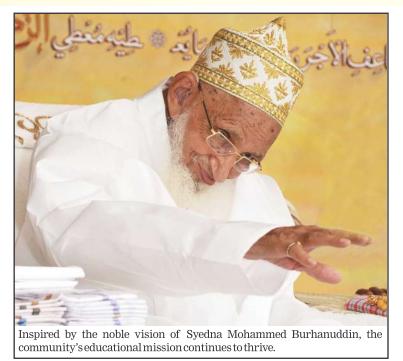
Like all teenagers I looked for purpose as I battled with teenage

"What was I meant to do?" I asked myself many times as I completed my matric exams. During my high school years, whenever people asked me what I wanted to do in the future, I swung like a pendulum between multiple interests, ranging from architecture to writing.

Yet, I was clear about one thing: I wanted to do something that had a higher purpose. If it were to be architecture, I aimed to build masajid and community centres. I had witnessed a spree of masajids being constructed during Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin's R. eminent era. If it were writing, I wanted to write in praise for my ultimate muse-Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}.

Eventually, and through no coincidence, (it's all fated, isn't it) my interest in writing led me to pursue my Mass Communication degree. As soon as I graduated, I was approached by the principal of MSB Shabbirabad, Farida ben Tawawala, a graceful, inspiring lady, who was an acquaintance. She persuaded me to join as an English teacher for Grades 9-10 and, like a novice, thinking that anyone could teach, I jumped in headfirst.

This was my first experience as part of a community school system, and there was no turning back. My language skills allowed me to build bridges with my students. "Where do I begin? The list of benefits is endless," I always reply.

The truth is, there is no tangible way to list down the myriad of intangible benefits the community school system has to offer. This can only be felt by someone who trusts the system and the vision of our spiritual leaders who set this educational revolution into motion.

Tracing this revolution back to the tumultuous initial days of

Syedna Taher Saifuddin's^{RA} era as Dai al Mutlaq, it was the 51st Dai who placed his astute finger on the pulse of the matter. It was education that would lead the community of Dawoodi Bohras into prosperity into the 21st century.

The first Imani school foundation stone in Jamnagar dates to 20th April 1920 AD, 2 Shaban al-Karim 1338, Tuesday. By 1377 AH, two hundred and seventy-eight functional educational institutions were serving the community.

His Holiness' Syedna Taher Saifuddin's^{RA} vision was to ensure the seamless integration of spiritual and material knowledge. Designed in light of the Qur'an and the Shari'at, the curriculum of such schools would address all the developmental areas that make up the whole child, including social,

On the auspicious occasion of the Milad of Amir ul Mumineen Maulana Ali ibn Abi Talib^{SA} on the 13th of Rajab 1377 AH, the educational department was renamed from al-Sighah al-Ilmiyyah to Da'erat ut-Tarbiyat wal-Ta'lim. Syedna Taher Saifuddin $^{\scriptscriptstyle R\,A}$ established two hundred ninety-seven educational institutions by the year 1381 AH.

At a time when others were oblivious to the benefits of higher education in the subcontinent, al-Dai al-Ajal Syedna Taher Saifuddin^R proclaimed the essential principles of higher learning to the world. While his advice was aimed towards the Muslim community and humanity at large, it was the Dawoodi Bohra community members who were blessed to receive guidance for integrating spiritual and secular education in an unprecedented show of educational revival, revolution and transformation in the community.

The 52nd Dai al Mutlaq Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}, who had been an integral part of every effort made by his illustrious father, took his ancestor's vision ahead by establishing Al Madrasa tus Saifiyah tul Burhaniyah in 1405 Hijri in Nairobi, Karachi and Mumbai. This memorable year marked the 1400th Milad of Imam Husain^{AS} and the 100th Milad of Syedna Taher Saifuddin^{RA}. The focus was crystal clear-to ensure an environment that would safeguard young minds by imparting knowledge in the light of Al Quran, inculcating the concepts of Islam and Iman. With such a firm and lofty foundation, the youth of the community would be prepared to take on the world and its challenges, thriving in this world and the hereafter.

Today, a chain of 25 Al Madrasa tus Saifiyah tul Burhaniyah institutes continue to impart quality education as per the vision of Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}, who lovingly planted its seed and watered it. Thousands of young minds have been nurtured under the shade of the $tree\,it\,has\,flour is hed\,into.$

Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin Aga^{TUS} has combined the endeavours of all his forefathers as He bestows a unique form of attention to each voung student, asking specifically whether he or she studies at an Imani school. I recall in a bethak at Burhani Mahal in Karachi in the year 1439 Hijri, as I stood in line for salam. I whispered to Mufaddal Maula TUS, teach at Badri School, Maula." His smile widened. Maulana^{TUS} turned to Shazada Husain Bhaisaheb^{DM} and repeated, "Badri School ma parhaway chay." That moment, those words--they are my fortune.

I say to all those who may have reservations about the quality of academics at community schools: there may be a thousand school systems out there that may glitter as gold. But you will find none fueled by the divine prayers of our blessed Father and Guide.

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The Legacy of Dawoodi Bohras in Kolkata

In 1964, Kolkata bore witness to a rare and cherished moment as Syedna Taher Saifuddin and his successor Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin graced the Dawoodi Bohra community. Their visit stood as a bridge between faith and heritage in a city where the Bohras, for over a century, had quietly built lives of trust, trade, and devotion.

Kolkata is a city of many communities, each leaving its mark on the city's streets, markets, and memory. The Dawoodi Bohras are one such community though their presence is often quieter than most, threaded into the city's fabric in ways that are subtle but enduring.

Their story here stretches back more than a century and a half, beginning in the 1850s, when a handful of traders from Gujarat arrived in what was then Calcutta, the commercial capital of British India. They came from Surat and Khambhat, ports that had shaped Bohra enterprise for generations, but it was to the east that opportunity now beckoned.

The Hooghly River was alive with ships, the markets were dense with goods from across the world, and for those with an eye for trade and a reputation for trust, Calcutta promised permanence.

Those early families arrived with little more than what they could carry. Stuff like ledgers, bolts of cloth, crates of hardware, and prayer books tucked into bags. They were not conquerors, nor opportunists looking for quick gain, but settlers' intent on building lives that could sustain their children and their children's children. The first thing they did was what Bohras have always done wherever they put down roots: they looked for a place to

By the 1920s, their numbers had grown enough to warrant a masjid of their own. Saifee Masjid rose on Brabourne Road, modest in scale, but it carried weight in symbolism. Its walls spoke of grandeur, its arches of faith, its very existence a declaration that the Bohras had come here to belong.

As decades passed and the community spread across the city, another masjid was built in Topsia, named Burhani Masjid, its presence visible even to passersby unfamiliar with the community's story. When Ramadan nights overflowed with community members, prayers inevitably spilt into Badri Hall at Chandni Chowk and into the halls of Saifee School. These spaces became sanctuaries of memory: countless majalis, Quran recitations, weddings, and funerals etched themselves into their walls. Every Bohra family in Kolkata can recall a moment tied to these masjids, like a child's first Quran class, the solemnity of a funeral prayer, or a Ramadan evening that stretched late into the

By then, the geography of their lives had taken shape. Families made their homes in Topsia, Chandni Chowk, Zakaria Street, Ripon Street, Park Circus, and Howrah. The pattern was never of isolation but of integration: a masjid or prayer hall at the centre, families clustered nearby, shops lining the main streets. To walk through these neighbourhoods is to see continuity in motion: three generations working side by side in the same shop, the grandfather dealing with suppliers, the father greeting customers, the grandson

handling digital accounts, all united by the same ethic that had carried the first traders from Surat to Calcutta.

That ethic was trust. In the early years, Bohras dealt mostly in hardware and machinery, serving a city hungry for tools as its

infrastructure grew. Over time, they moved into textiles, and more recently, into computers and information technology. Today, around 4,000 Bohras live in Kolkata, running some 750 shops. Yet their real strength has never been numbers. It has been the reputation they cultivated: a Bohra merchant's word was his bond. Customers returned not just for the product but for the certainty that they would be treated fairly. Generations later, this remains the community's greatest currency.

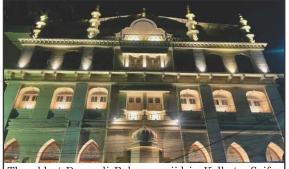

But the community's presence in Kolkata is also institutional. The Dawoodi Bohra Jamaat Trust, through Aniuman-e-Mohammedi and Anjuman-e-Badri, has efficiently carried the responsibility of keeping the community whole. It is here that disputes are settled, majalis are organised, schools are run, and welfare is coordinated. It is the body that ensures no member feels abandoned in a city of millions.

Faith and service flow seamlessly into each other. During Ramadan, masjids overflow with families, the air alive with prayer and the smell of food prepared for iftar. In Muharram, Ashara sermons gather the community in deep reflection, generations sitting side by side in shared devotion. On ordinary days, volunteers arrange outreach clinics, coordinate food distribution, and keep watch over the elderly. For those outside the community, these details often go unnoticed, but they are what sustain the Bohra presence in the

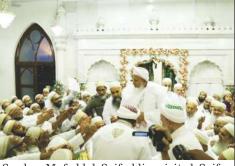

Saifee Golden Jubilee School Marks Six Decades of Growth and Excellence

In the bustling heart of Kolkata, just off Park Street, stands Saifee Golden Jubilee School (SGJS), an institution that has grown in step with the city's own evolution. Established in 1964 by Dr. Syedna Taher Saifuddin^{RA}, the 51st Spiritual Leader of the Dawoodi Bohra community, the school began with just five students. Today, it has nearly 2,200 children on its rolls and produces around 200 graduates each year.

Affiliated to the Indian School Certificate (ISC) board, SGJS runs classes from Nursery to Class XII and offers three major streams -Science, Commerce, and Humanities. With a faculty of 140 trained teachers, many with decades of classroom experience, the school has built a reputation for academic strength combined with personal attention.

The school's facilities match its scale and ambition. Modern Physics, Chemistry and Biology laboratories, a well-stocked library, and three computer rooms provide students with the resources they need to explore both traditional and



contemporary fields of study. Spread across two buildings and covering close to 100,000 square feet, the campus has recently added a new administrative wing and dedicated offices for Deeni Taalim (religious studies), reflecting its commitment to both academic and cultural learning.

The guidance of the Dawoodi Bohra leadership has been central to the school's growth. After the passing of Dr. Syedna Taher Saifuddin^{RA}, his successor Dr. Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}, the 52nd Spiritual Leader, took a close interest in the school's progress. He visited twice, personally appointed principals, and laid the foundation stone of the building that now

houses the Girls' Section. Today, the institution continues to function under the guidance and blessings of the present leader, Dr. Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS}

For six consecutive years the school has been recognized at the State Government's Republic Day Parade, while its achievements have also been acknowledged at The Telegraph School Awards.

The impact of the school can perhaps best be measured in its alumni. Over the years, SGJS has produced doctors, lawyers, IT professionals, entrepreneurs, and

civil servants. From its modest beginnings six decades ago to its current position as one of Kolkata's respected educational institutions, Saifee Golden Jubilee School continues to play a significant role in shaping young lives while contributing to the city's social and intellectual fabric.

Its location, overlooking two expansive lakes of 15-20 acres, promises a serene and inspiring environment conducive to learning and reflection.

Equally significant is its placement in the heart of the Mumineen Mohallah, where nearly 80% of Mumineen families live within a 15-minute distance. This proximity ensures accessibility and strengthens community bonds.

For the Mumineen of Kolkata, this project is not merely a building—it is a cherished dream. With prayers and dedication, they eagerly await the day when Moula^{TUS} will grace the campus with Iftetah Mubarak, marking the culmination of years of aspiration.

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A Legacy of *Khidmat* from Kolkata

I am a first-generation immigrant to the United States, born in Kolkata, where my mother's family had settled after her parents relocated from their ancestral home in Surat. Kolkata was a thriving center during the colonial period and continued to be a bustling and prosperous metropolis after India's Independence. My grandfather, Shaikh Mohsin bhai Motiwalla, moved to Kolkata in 1944. Endowed with an entrepreneurial spirit and sharp business acumen, he went on to establish Excel Cosmetics, which manufactured a range of products, including talcum powder and hair

Shaikh Mohsin bhai had a strong sense of civic duty and understood the value of "community outreach"—as we label it these days! Within a decade, he became Vice President of the Dawoodi Bohra Merchant Association, which provided Qardan Hasana to jamaat members. He also became an active member of the Muslim Institute, developing strong ties with key community members and politicians in Kolkata, which eventually led to his becoming a pivotal public relations figure.

I had the pleasure of interviewing his second eldest son, Shaikh Abdulqader bhai Motiwalla, who was born in Surat, but helped manage one of "Pappaji's' businesses. Shaikh Abdulqader bhai recalled that "Pappaji" was very involved with the community affairs for the Dawoodi Bohras in West Bengal. One of the turning points in Shaikh Mohsin bhai's khidmat was his involvement from the outset in the Saifee Golden Jubilee English Public School (Saifee Hall School). In 1962, on the occasion of the 50th year of Syedna Taher Saifuddin's ascension to the post of Dai al-Mutlaq, Saifee Golden Jubilee English Public School was established by HimRA under the Madrasa Tayabiyah Society. The objective of Saifee Hall School was to impart a holistic education including Deeni Talim with general

education in the English medium. Shaikh Mohsin bhai had the incomparable honor of holding the vessel from which Syedna Taher Saifuddin^{RA} scooped out the cement to lay the foundation for the school during his Kolkata visit in 1962. With Maula's^{RA} dua mubarak, my mother, Munira Munaim, and her sister were two of the six students in the first class.

From 1962 to around 1980, Shaikh Mohsin bhai was heavily involved in all aspects of the administrative and educational affairs for Saifee Hall School. While its prominence grew amongst all local communities. Saifee Hall School gradually started buying adjoining properties. From its inception, the Saifee Hall School grew to its current student size of 2,600, including children of highranking political figures in West Bengal. Its curriculum and teaching became a prestigious educational standard on both, deeni and secular fronts, where top universities have accepted Saifee Hall School students. These achievements would not have been possible



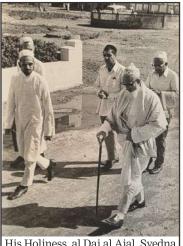

without the dua mubarak of our Duat Mutlageen and the assistance of the Administration of West Bengal. Today, it boasts many educational facilities such as laboratories and an air-conditioned mini theater that connects online to Mahad-uz-Zahra in Surat.

Having been involved in khidmat for nearly 30 years, Shaikh Mohsin bhai had the honor of seven ziyafats, four ziyafats with al Dai al Ajal, Syedna Taher Saifuddin^{RA} and three ziyafats with al-Dai al-Ajal, Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}. Following the bestowing of his khidmat titles, Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin

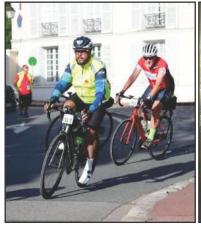

Idris Sibatra- A Story of Faith, Adrenaline, & Cycling

In Kolkata, where mornings usually begin in a rush of horns and heat, Idris Sibatra prefers to start differently. Long before the streets fill, he is already on his bicycle, sometimes alone, sometimes with friends, clocking kilometres that have quietly defined his life.

Cycling, for Idris, was never a trend. It began in childhood, encouraged by his father, who often said, "The body is like a machine; you must keep it in motion, or it will rust." From afternoons of football at the maidaan to long rides along the Victoria Memorial and the Hooghly River, Idris's cycle became his closest companion. Today, he has covered more than 44,000 kilometres, earned the title of Super Randonneur six times. and even secured gold at the world-



renowned Paris-Brest-Paris endurance event in 2019.

Ask him why he rides, and his answer is simple: "It keeps me fit, it keeps me going." A hardware businessman by profession, Idris spends long hours outdoors supervising containers and shipments. Cycling gives him the



stamina to endure, the clarity to focus, and the discipline to keep showing up.

But beyond personal fitness, Idris's story resonates with a wider message for the Dawoodi Bohra community. His Holiness Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin TUS has consistently reminded mumineen

of the importance of an active lifestyle. In sermons, he has encouraged daily walking and famously urged all to cultivate a "soldier's walk" that is upright, brisk, and purposeful.

So if we were to interpret a message, it'd be this: movement is not just about health, but about dignity, discipline, and readiness for life's challenges.

Idris embodies this guidance on two wheels. His long solo rides mirror the determination of steady progress; his weekend group rides reflect the value of community and shared strength. For him, the satisfaction comes not from glory but from steady improvement like finishing a route faster than last time, or

helping a friend push past their

At 44, Idris still rides with the energy he had as a boy. Every kilometre adds to a story of persistence, reminding us that fitness is not about grand gestures but small, regular commitments. His cycling journey serves as inspiration for mumineen across the globe: that sport, exercise, and physical vitality are deeply in line with the values our faith upholds.

As Idris puts it, "Most people already have a cycle lying at home. They just don't use it. The excuses are easy, but the road is always

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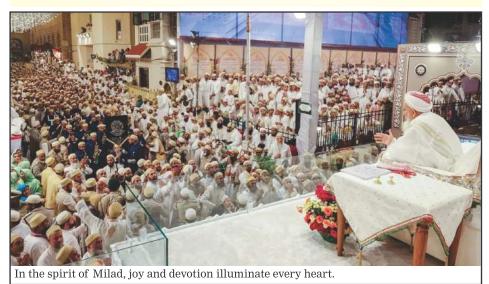
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The Calm in the Chaos

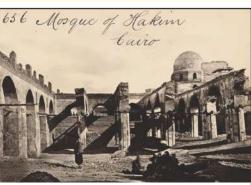
In the heart of ancient Cairo (Misr) rises Al-Jame al-Anwar, lovingly known as Jamea Anwar, a timeless jewel of the Fatemid era. More than a thousand years ago, Imam al-Hakim bi-Amr Allah^{AS} built this masjid as a shining center of faith, learning, and culture. For centuries, it stood as a beacon of spirituality and knowledge, guiding generations.

Time, however, took its toll. Years of neglect and decay dimmed its radiance, and its sacred halls fell silent. Then, in the late 20th century, a new chapter began. His Holiness Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}, with the unwavering support of Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin TUS breathed life back into this sacred monument. Through their vision and tireless efforts, Al-Jame al-Anwar once again rose in its full glory as a living testament to devotion, resilience, and the enduring power of faith. (Source: Misbah.info).

The dream of reviving Al-Jame al-Anwar began with Al-Dai al-Ajal Syedna Taher Saifuddin^{RA}, whose heart longed to see this Fatemid jewel restored. His beloved son, Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}, carried that vision forward, turning his father's heartfelt wish into action.

At the center of this extraordinary effort stood al-Dai al-Ajal Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS}, whose dedication and leadership became the driving force behind the successful completion of the project. Beginning in 1978, the restoration project was prefaced with an intensive cleaning programme personally led by Aali

Qadr Maula^{TUS} as the first step in restoring the sanctity of the masjid. This paved the way for further work, which included extensive research, planning and design, with numerous site visits by Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^R

For more than eight centuries, Al-Jame al-Anwar suffered severe neglect. By the early 20th century, its premises had been converted into a school, Madrasa Salahdar, inflicting serious damage to the masjid's sanctity. Toilets were built in the sehan (courtyard), the open courtvard became a playground. and the qibla area was bordered by a sewer. Attempts by authorities to close the school after its inception in 1902 failed, and the violation continued for decades. Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA} and Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS}. Maula's niyat was not only to restore the physical grandeur of the masjid but also to revive its soul as a centre of worship and barakaat for generations to come. With unwavering determination, strong faith, Maula continued despite every challenge, personally guiding and watching over the work with tireless dedication. In the Vaaz of Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin, Maula^{TUS} addressed Mazoon Saheb, Syedi Al Qaidjoher Bhaisaheb Ezzuddin^{DM} stating and complementing his assurance at that time: "Do not worry about the money." This steadfastness in faith and willingness to sacrifice ensured the successful completion of the project.



Beginning in 1978, the restoration project was prefaced with an intensive cleaning programme personally led by Syedna Saifuddin as the first step in restoring the sanctity of the masjid. This paved the way for further work, which included extensive research, planning and design, with numerous site visits by Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin.

The removal of the school during restoration is remembered as one of the "nine miracles of Al Jamel Al Anwar." The Madrasa was demolished and rebuilt in an adjoining area of Jame within just 110 days, revealing the original foundations of the masjid that had been hidden for centuries (Source: traditional community narrative).

When al-Dai al-Ajal Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin TUS first undertook the work to cleanse the masjid, even the municipal authorities of Cairo deemed it impossible. The sehan had become a dump yard, wild trees clung to the walls, and rubble was home to snakes, bats, and other harmful creatures. Yet, with unshakable Im'aan, deep humility, and boundless love for the Dai and the Awliya Kiram^{AS}, Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} personally led from the front. His luminous presence transformed impossible to possible. and his barakat inspired hundreds to join in khidmat. With his sleeves rolled up and his heart full of gratitude to Allah Talaa and His Dai Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin,

he demonstrated that no service is too small when done for the sake of ibadaat and farmaan. In only three days, the place that had been abandoned became clean and ready for the remembrance of Allah, a clear sign of his devotion, courage, and strong commitment to the Dai. Mumineen cleaned the area called the majaaz. Gradually, workers were hired, bulldozers brought in, and even the fire brigade helped wash the towering minarets. With every layer of debris cleared, dirt and rubble were ultimately removed from the masjid with an astonishing scale of effort, a chapter of history resurfaced (Source: Dawoodi Bohra Heritage Archives).

At the dawn of the new Islamic year 1401H (15th Islamic Calendar), Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^R graced Cairo with Ashara Mubaraka sermons that coincided with the historic inauguration of Jame Al Anwar. For ten sacred days, from the 2nd of Muharram until Ashura, the masjid came alive with the voices and prayers of nearly 10,000 devoted mumineengathered in unity, in tears, in remembrance. It was not just a congregation: it was a moment of spiritual rebirth, a revival of Jame Al Anwar after centuries of silence, illuminated once more by the barakat of Syedna's presence and the sacrifice of Imam Husain^{AS}.

The revival of Jame al-Anwar was not just the restoration of a single masjid, it became a shining precedent, a beacon that inspired the renewal of countless other Fatimi monuments across Cairo. From its blessed reopening flowed a wave of devotion: new Bohra masjids and community centres rose across the world, while the sacred shrines of Ahl al-Bayt, noble mausolea, and historic masjids including the revered masjid of Imam Ali ibn Abi Talib^{AS} in Kufa were lovingly restored. Each effort stood as a testament to Svedna Mohammed Burhanuddin's R. vision, to rekindle the light of faith and heritage, and to bind the community to its glorious legacy.

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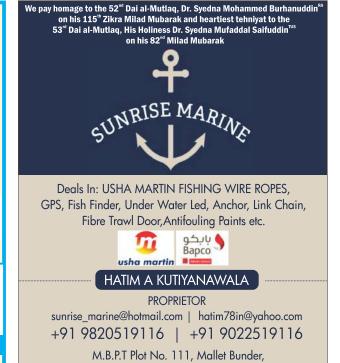

The restoration of Al-Jame al-Anwar was a journey of faith filled with extraordinary events, remembered as the "nine miracles" within the Dawoodi Bohra community. Regarding each of these nine miracles, a detailed bayan in Ashara Vaaz Mubarak was delivered, explaining and reflecting upon every single one. Cleaning and Excavation. Restoration completion in 27 months. While digging two meters down original continuous foundations of the pillars were found. Hakim Imams B'ir (well) was relieved during the revival and restoration of the masjid. The historical original tablets were found. The discovery of a Fatemi shubbaak, a grille with floral pattern from the original masjid was discovered. The Mishkat al-Anwar and its design was another hidden Fatemi relic which was discovered. It was destined for the Fatemi Dai Sydena Burhanuddin^R to reveal it. In the original construction Imam Hakim^{AS} placed it in 400 lanterns. The school Madrash was built in the sehen of masjid along with basketball court and football pitch all in masjids courtyard, which was removed and placed in a different place in just 110

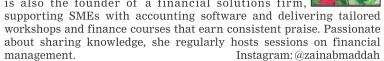

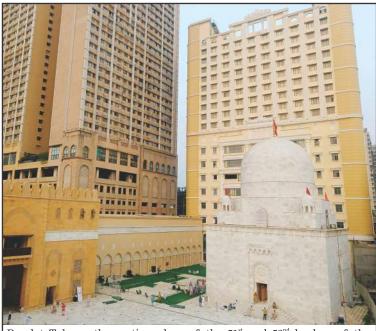

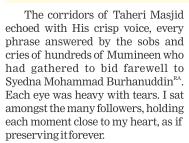
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The Connection Remains Unbroken

Syedna Mohammad Burhanuddin^{RA} had graced the city of lights to host His 93rd Milad. That safar remains etched in memory as one of the most radiant chapters in Karachi's history. And when that memorable safar came to an end, the city was blessed with the most beautiful and impactful statements from our beloved Da'i. "Agar tamnay kabhi mari yaad awe, toh maathu jukhawi ne, aankhon si ansoo jaari kari ne, manay pukaarso, jo main tamari madad per na awu toh main Imam-uz-Zaman^{AS} no Da`I Nahin." At just fourteen, I may not have fully grasped the depth of those words, yet something within me knew they held the key to success in both this world and the next. And so, with a child's faith and a heart brimming with love, I closed my eyes and carved his promise upon the walls of my heart and soul.

Years have passed, but those words have never left me. In the moments of uncertainty, they have been my anchor, in the minutes of darkness, they have been my light, and in the hours of grief, they have been my only joy, my only hope. His assurance continues to echo within me, reminding me that the bond between Maula and Mumin is not one of time or place - it is eternal.

In the early months of 2007, 3 years after this particular Safar, my life took an unpredictable turn. I was 16, and I was getting married. For some, it was too soon; for

others, it was too uncertain. Unwarranted advice was offered along with a lot of criticism, but for my parents, the raza of Syedna Mohammad Burhanuddin RA mattered the most. They were certain that if this step is carried forward with the dua and raza mubarak of our beloved Da`i, then no worldly skepticism could weaken their resolve. However, as a student who just ventured into the first year of college, the only thing that made the situation seem less daunting was Moula's words. Countless times, I did the actlowering my head, closing my eyes, with tears streaming down my face, remembering my Maula^{RA}, and not even once was I left alone. Syedna Mohammad Burhanuddin^{RA} often reminded us that nikah is not a burden but a shield, not an ending but a beginning. My life is a living testimony of the words said.

After a year when I embraced

motherhood, I was barely seventeen. I was naturally afraid. How could someone so young nurture another soul, when I myself was still learning what it meant to grow? Sleepless nights blurred into anxious days, and often I wondered if I knew enough to make it through the day, let alone life. Each time, when the fright of the unknown would threaten me, I would do the deed-lowering my head, watering the harbors of my eyes with love and reverence, chanting Syedna Mohammad Burhanuddin's name, and somehow, a thousand bulbs would light up my soul. Motherhood became my madrasa, teaching me patience, endurance, and trust. I often recalled how Syedna Mohammad Burhanuddin^{RA} reminded us that a mother's lap is the first madrasa for her child.

When my son turned two, I decided to pursue my education. It seemed even more challenging than getting married or giving

birth, because I did not only have dreams but a lot of duties as well. The idea of stepping back into a college classroom and preparing for exams seemed very exhausting and overwhelming already. I sought permission from my husband. because Syedna Mohammad Burhanuddin^{RA}, time and again in his sermons, had taught us the sacred balance of married life: that a home flourishes when decisions are made with mutual respect. consultation, and harmony. Syedna Mohammad Burhanuddin^{RA} amidst sharing a lot of practical solutions to many clouded aspects of life during His mawaiz had once spoken about how a mother is not just the nurturer of her children but the architect of generations to come. Since then, I wanted to equip myself with everything that would help me become a better mother, wife, and above all a person.

Returning to education after becoming a wife and mother was nothing like the schooldays I had left behind. It required more discipline, more sacrifice, and above all, more faith. I completed my college, then university, and eventually pursued not one but two master's degrees. Between my son's needs and my own aspirations, between family responsibilities and personal growth, there were countless moments, when I felt like giving up. There were days when assignments

had to be written after midnight once my child was asleep, and exams prepared for with a baby's cry echoing in the background. I held dearly onto my lifesaver- the memory of Syedna Mohammad Burhanuddin^{RA}, and His promise. Yet, every time I felt I could not carry on, I turned to the same source of strength: lowering my head, closing my eyes, calling upon my Maula^{RA}, and once again, light would find me.

My academic journey soon turned into my professional journey. I began teaching at an imani school, because I wanted to give back to students what Moula^{RA} had instilled in me: the courage to learn, the strength to persevere, and the faith that I was never left alone. Now, after thirteen years, I find myself in a place I could never have imagined then: leading in the education sector, guiding teachers and students alike. This, to me, is the greatest blessing, to serve others through the gift of knowledge. And yet, even today, whenever I find myself at a crossroads, unsure of the path ahead, I still do the same act I learned as a child: I lower my head, close my eyes, and call upon my Maula^{RA}. 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How often do you feel stuck in a

The probabilities of 'yes' is alarming, only if you sit and take an effort to rewind your everyday life over the last decade. That is when you realize you are in a conundrum. The orbit and the speed remained constant. The uncertainties, never welcomed.

This year, Ashara 1447 in Chennai was aimed at change. A change in every sphere of life. The change of orbit, the change in the trajectory, the change in the level of work, the change of environment, the change of speed, the change in the mindset, the change of perspective. But often we forget that this change requires muscle, movement, and momentum.

Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin Maula^{TUS}, mentioned during Ashara sermons, that science and deen are parallel. If one wants to follow the principles of deen, one should understand the science behind it. Astrophysics is what Maula taught us this year. We all have known of the Big Bang as the reason of the creation of this universe, but a deeper perspective lies in that smallest particle of dust which serves as structural and functional unit of this universal system. So, if one has to understand the study of stars, Astrophysics may be overwhelming, what has to be

studied is Particle physics. The phenomenon behind astrophysics.

The gross-motor and fine motor movements in this solar system is what cause the revolution, rotation, seasons, climate, day and night and even the tides in the ocean. Despite the movements large and small, what keeps this constant is the gravity. The single force of attraction, the centripetal force that gives the freedom of movement vet binds us all to this one central force.

One may think how does this relate to life itself?

It very much does all one has to do is take an effort to understand these movements and the cause and effect it has on earth.

Let's go back to our 3rd grade science class. Water cycle, the diagram, the arrows and states of water in different stages. How one

That one moment where you rise to the highest level is the sum of to those thousands of moments of grief and despair and the difficulties vou overcome to reach there. All one needs to do is wait and in that wait, constant harakat is required to manifest that moment. Just like particle physics. The atom

is the only indestructible substance.. and the energy it carries can neither be created nor be destroyed. The electrons in the orbits and the protons and neutrons in the nucleus. and the further photon particles that accelerates the movements in the atoms. And also how beautifully the atomic configurations are. The positive at the heart and the electrons with constant revolving around the nucleus.

Human anatomy is similar. The structural and the functional unit of the nervous system is the neuron. And how the neurons passes information in the form of electricity to the nearby neurons creating a neural network and signaling the response (movement of the muscle) of the stimulus perceived by the sense organs. And this happens so quick.

Therefore, Change is the only constant. And to get the barakaat of Maula TUS's dua to reach to the highest levels in all spheres of life, all we need to do is harakat. Barakat will follow by default.

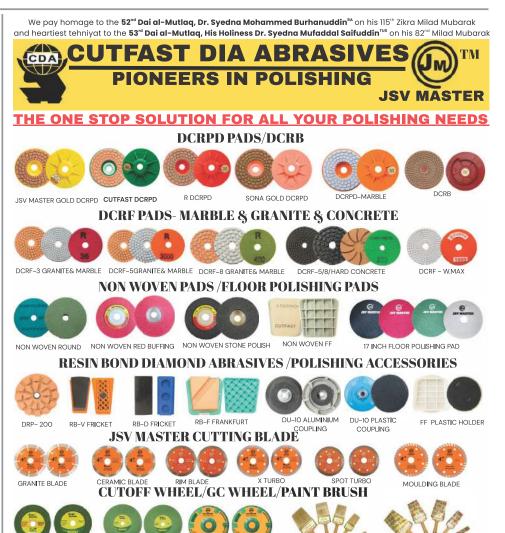

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The architecture of The Dawoodi Bohras: An Acoustic Heritage

I am a Dawoodi Bohra, and from my time spent in Denmark, I have learned only one thing: there is no place like home. There is no place that sounds like home.

When I step into a Bohra masjid, whether in Mumbai, Cairo, or Nairobi, I am reminded that our spaces are not only about walls and domes, arches and minarets—they are about resonance. They hold memory in both stone and sound. They carry the pulse of maatam, the unison of qasidas, the rhythm of recitation, the murmurs of prayer.

As an acoustician, I cannot help but listen to these spaces differently. I hear how carved wooden doors scatter echoes, how courtyards soften footsteps, how domes amplify a single voice and turn it into a collective chorus. For me, architecture is not only visual-it is auditory heritage. The Dawoodi Bohra tradition has given us buildings that are, in essence, instruments of devotion. Architecture isn't just a visual canvas for the Dawoodi Bohra community—it shapes how devotion resounds within space. Nestled at the confluence of Fatimid-Islamic design and Guiarati craftsmanship, their buildings whisper stories of art, history, and collective memory. From ornamented facades to domed prayer halls, every surface plays a role in how sound travels, echoes, and envelops the worshipper.

Origins and Synthesis of Style The core of this architectural tradition lies in a harmonious fusion of design legacies. On one hand, there are the defining elements of Islamic architecture-mihrabs oriented toward Qibla, graceful arches, ceilings adorned with calligraphy or floral arabesques. On the other, Gujarat's indigenous techniques emerge in richly carved woodwork, bracketed chhajjas, painted ceilings, and fretted jali screens.

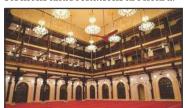

Sound and Space

Imagine standing beneath a high, colonnaded nave, where arches create rhythmic intervals that fragment sound into soft echoes. Jali screens break up harsh reflections while inviting ventilation and light. Timber details—doors, window frames, and ceiling beams—absorb and soften tones, especially in the mid-range, lending speech clarity and musical warmth. Under domes and semidomes, early reflections can focus sound, but ornament and textured surfaces scatter it, avoiding harsh focal points and flutter. Colonnades, carnets and domes are not just structural—they shape the way sermons and recitations are heard.

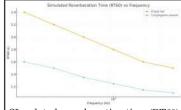

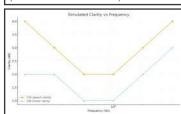
Reverberation: A Living **Dance**

Reverberation is a dance between structure and occupancy. Empty halls may exhibit RT60 values from approximately 2.4 seconds in low frequencies (125 Hz) to around 1.5

seconds at higher frequencies (4,000 Hz). Once a congregation fills the space— carpets, attire, and bodies adding absorption—reverberation drops into the 1.1 to 1.6 second range, ideally balancing clarity with resonance. Speech remains intelligible (C50 around +2 to +4 dB), while chants and hymns (C80 around +1 to +3 dB) gain body without losing coherence. 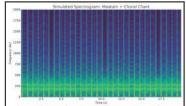
Clarity indices show the hall's dual purpose: Speech remains intelligible while music and chant are enriched.

Echoes of Ritual: Maatam and Hymnody

The ritual of Maatam, with its rhythmic chest-beats, generates low pulses ($\sim 50-150$ Hz) that resonate physically within the hall. These are not just sounds but embodied vibrations, felt in the chest cavity of every participant and reinforced by the room itself. The beat becomes both a personal act of remembrance and a collective rhythm that synchronizes the congregation.

Layered over this pulse are sustained gasida or tilawat choral voices, often centered around fundamentals in the 150-250 Hz range with rich harmonic overtones. Here the architecture plays a decisive role: mid-band reverberance sustains these tones just long enough to allow voices to blend seamlessly, transforming individual singers into a single, unified chorus. At the same time, the diffusion from carvings, jali, and textile surfaces prevents words from dissolving into blur, preserving the lyrical clarity needed for devotion and understanding.

What emerges is a carefully balanced acoustic ritual, where the percussive depth of maatam and the melodic height of chant interlock within the space. The hall itself becomes a resonant body, amplifying the emotional intensity of grief and remembrance. In this way, architecture does not merely host the ritual—it participates in it, becoming a silent choir that shapes raw sound into immersive waves of collective devotion.

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Impulse, Energy, and Envelopment

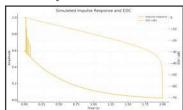
Impulse responses in such spaces show clusters of strong early reflections arriving within the first 50-80 milliseconds, typically bouncing off domes, arches, and large wall surfaces. These reflections are what give a single spoken word or a line of recitation its sense of presence and intimacy — the voice feels immediate but also supported by the room. The geometry of domes can sometimes concentrate sound into a "hotspot," but in Bohra halls, this tendency is tempered by ornamental details and distributed surfaces that break up and scatter the energy.

After this initial burst of reflections, the sound energy transitions into a smooth exponential decay, which acousticians describe using reverberation curves. In Bohra architecture, this decay does not stretch endlessly, like in a stone cathedral where speech becomes blurred, nor does it die abruptly, like in a carpeted classroom where sound feels dry and lifeless. Instead, the decay sustains long enough to enrich voices and hymns, while still allowing syllables and consonants to remain intelligible.

The high-frequency tail of the decay is particularly well controlled. Carved woodwork, jali screens, carpets, and fabrics absorb or scatter the sharper components of sound, preventing excessive brightness or shrillness. What remains is a reverberant field that is warm, enveloping, and balanced across the spectrum.

Energy Decay Curves (EDC) measured or simulated in such environments illustrate this balance clearly: a steady downward slope with slight multi-slope behavior, indicating that different frequency bands decay at different rates. The

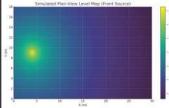
lower and mid frequencies tend to linger, carrying the body of voices and the rhythm of maatam, while the higher frequencies taper off sooner, ensuring clarity. For the listener, this translates into a space that feels neither overwhelming nor sterile—a carefully tuned acoustic middle ground that supports both ritual and community life.



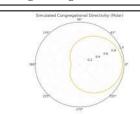
Simulated impulse response with early reflections from arches and domes. The EDC curve shows a controlled decay supporting both speech and song.

Spatial Sound Distribution

Sound in Dawoodi Bohra spaces is never confined to the front. The design ensures that recitation projects clearly while the reverberant field sustains envelopment. This is achieved not by accident, but by the spatial logic of colonnades, courtyards, and domes, which distribute reflections in many directions. A voice from the front — whether an imam leading prayer or a zakir reciting does not travel in a narrow beam; it blossoms outward, reinforced by early reflections and carried by a reverberant cushion that fills the hall. The result is that worshippers at the back or seated in side aisles still feel immersed in the same collective soundscape. In moments of maatam or choral hymnody, this envelopment transforms individual voices into a unified field of devotion, where one does not just hear the sound but feels surrounded by it.

Craft as an Acoustic Tool

Material and texture are acoustic instruments in themselves. Stucco and stone walls reflect evenly; wood panels absorb and diffuse; jali screens leak mid-to-high frequencies in beneficial ways, reducing echo without dulling ambiance. Thoughtful arrangement of such features, combined with natural absorption sources, yields spaces that

feel both alive and intimate. Beyond their functional role, these materials create a signature timbre unique to Bohra spaces — the soft warmth of carpets underfoot, the velvet damping of drapery, the bright scatter of intricate carvings, the subtle filtering of air and sound through patterned screens. In combination, they transform architecture into an ensemble, where each surface plays its part in shaping the experience. It is this orchestration of texture that ensures a Dawoodi Bohra hall never sounds sterile, but instead resonates with a living quality — a space that breathes, remembers, and responds to the voices it holds.

A Living Sonic Legacy

Ultimately, Dawoodi Bohra architecture is a finely tuned cultural instrument. Every carved bracket,

every jali, every dome contributes to a larger acoustic composition, shaping how voices and sounds interact within space. These buildings do not simply contain activity; they actively enhance it. Conversations become clearer, recitations gain warmth, and communal gatherings are infused with a sense of cohesion that comes as much from the acoustics as from the architecture itself.

What sets these spaces apart is the intentionality of craft passed down through generations. Builders and artisans may not have spoken in the technical language of reverberation times or diffusion coefficients, yet their choices of material, texture, and proportion were guided by deep experiential knowledge. Over time, these decisions have created spaces that are acoustically balanced—neither overwhelming nor dry, but resonant in a way that supports both intimacy and collective expression.

In this sense, Dawoodi Bohra architecture can be read as a form of acoustic heritage: a design tradition where form, material, and sound converge to create environments that are not just seen, but heard and felt.

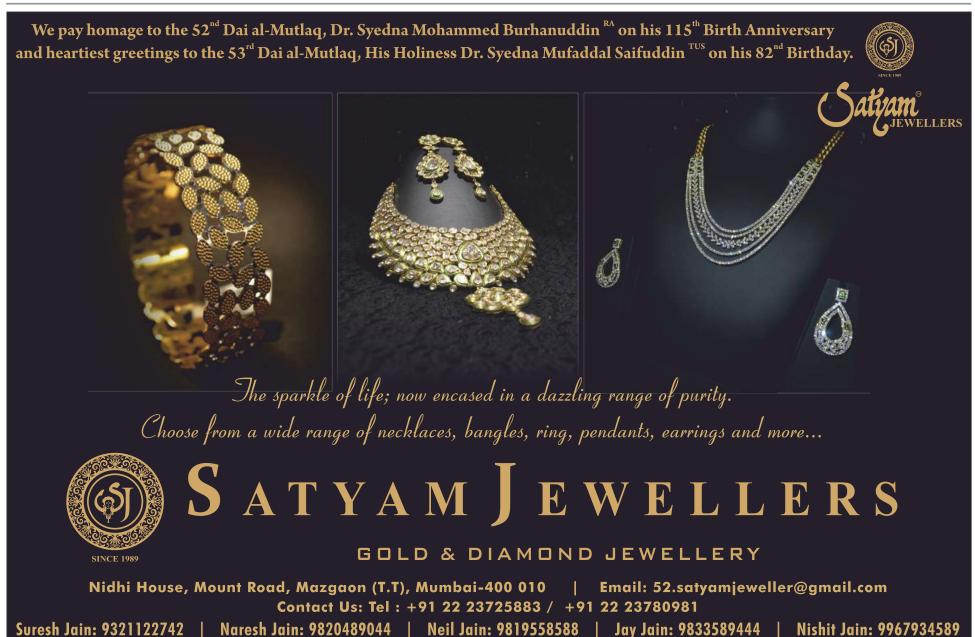

Los Angeles: On Saturday, September 20th, the air inside Masjid Ezzi was thick with the aroma of spices, sizzling pans, and anticipation. The occasion was Zaiqa (taste) War, a men's culinary competition organized as part of the Ta'abudaat lineup of activities culminating in Milad celebrations.

Eight teams of five contestants each stepped into the culinary battlefield, with 60 minutes on the clock and a secret ingredient: keema. Contestants had to "grocery shop" from a stacked table of ingredients and craft a meal that showcased not only taste but also creativity and teamwork.

Among the participants was my husband, captaining the team aptly named Culinary Wizards. Alongside him were Taher Chawala, Kaid Khetty, Ali Abbas Udaipurwala, and Hussain Merchant. The majority of them are members of the Mawaid khidmat serving committee. Together, they brought their service-oriented spirit into the competition, guided by their captain, Shabbir Baldiwala.

The competition exceeded all expectations. While organizers initially hoped for four or five teams, double that number registered, including DCP Boyz (Deeni Cooking Players), who drove 12 hours from Arizona, a group that also serves their local community through FMB Thaali.

The Roti Resurgence

For those unfamiliar, roti, also called chapati, or Indian flatbread. is the daily staple at most South Asian Muslim dinner tables. But in many households, the tradition has been quietly slipping away, replaced by store-bought tortillas laden with preservatives. This year, however, a renewed call has been made within the Bohra community: return to the art of



homemade roti.

Roti, after all, is more than food. It is culture, heritage, and a daily reminder of togetherness. Making it is an act of love and a way of sustaining both body and

My Own Roti Journey

My first conscious memory of roti-making takes me back to my grandfather's home in Madras. In that musty old building with its sunlit courtyard, the extended family would gather for breakfast. My aunts rose at 4:30 a.m. to roll out perfect circles of dough, flick them onto the tawa, and pile them high with a dash of ghee. The smoky warmth, the heavenly aroma, and the taste of roti with homemade morabbha, mango jam, are etched in my memory as the food of love.

Yet, growing up, I resisted the expectation to master this skill. My father would tease, "What will you

feed your husband and kids?" To which I shot back, "My husband will make the rotis!" I saw rotimaking then as a chore, something that tied women down, and I wanted to carve out a different kind of life for myself.

It was only years later, listening to my Moula, Syedna Aali Qadr Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} talking of Mohabbat ni Roti, that I returned to roti, clumsily at first, with my kids laughing at my "continent-shaped" creations. But in that laughter, something else took root. Rotimaking became our family activity, a bonding moment, a bridge between generations. I realized roti was not a symbol of servitude, but of love, empowerment, and connection

"Between flour and fire, love takes form, a circle of bread that keeps us

warm."

Stars in the Kitchen

At Zaiqa War, roti-making was a central part of the competition. Watching men of all ages, from teens to retirees, knead dough, roll circles, and flip rotis was more than just entertainment. It was a cultural shift. Work once considered "women's work" was embraced with enthusiasm, artistry, and pride.

In his sermons, Syedna Aali Qadr Saifuddin Moula^{TUS} reminded us of the significance of Mohabbat ni roti, that making roti is not bound to gender, but open to all. Moula Himself demonstrated this

by rolling rotis in multiple locations, showing that simple acts of service are the essence of faith.

As I watched the men cook, I recalled Aqua Moula's teachings from this past Ashura, that star, when gathered, forms constellations. That evening, the contestants were like stars themselves, each unique, yet together shining so brightly that the judges found it impossible to choose a single winner. Every dish was prepared with love, beautifully plated, and presented with care.

More Than Food

Roti-making, in its essence, is creation itself. It is empowerment, service, and continuity. It connects us to our ancestors, much like starlight that still reaches us centuries after a star has died. My grandfather's love, my aunts' hands working the dough, my children's laughter as they mocked my misshapen circles, all of that warmth continues, like light traveling across time.

In this way, the humble roti becomes a manifestation of faith. It is proof that what we do today, no matter how small, matters. We may not change the entire world, but in feeding our families, serving our communities, and keeping traditions alive, we make a world of difference for generations yet to come.

"Hands that shape the dough by night,

leave stars of love that last in light."

And so, the real victory of Zaiqa War was not who won or lost, but the rekindling of a simple truth: in every roti rolled, in every meal shared, in every act of service, for we are stars in each other's lives, shining a little brighter together.

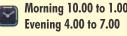

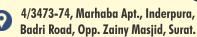
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The Science of Religion

I remember the peculiar feeling I had for the very first time I heard about 'atheists' - people who do not believe in the existence of God. The aforementioned statements define what atheists believe in a nutshell. "Well, this settles it once and for all. There is no God. Which turns out to be a good thing, considering the God most Americans believe in is a crazy, vengeful, ego-maniacal monster. Dawkins' insights are so cunning and profound you can't help feeling embarrassed for the

Interesting... aren't they? I realized one thing though: it is so easy and painless to become a non-believer. Believing in something is what takes strength and courage.

What perplexes me the most is the fact that some people treat science and religion as two different entities that run parallel and can never merge or meet till eternity. I do believe a little bit of conflict is actually important to create a sense of creativity and opportunity to learn in both directions and embrace openmindedness. But the entirety of the point is that you should find the questions more exhilarating than troubling. I definitely find this thought-provoking exploration of fundamental human questions more

exhilarating and liberating; they definitely do not challenge me.

Science is the creation of tools to test things we can test. Not about testing someone's faith or belief.

This year's Ashara was an eye opener. The knowledge about the origins of the universe and human

beings and the 'whys' were answered through the lens of science, implying that science and religion have always been one; we just need to change our angle of perception.

The science of scientists - Miracles

Since most scientists believe

that science and religion operate on different principles and paradigms, the lack of empirical evidence makes them skeptical about the concept of God. One of the questions posed about the significant component of religion is: How can anyone who understands the principles of science, accept the idea of miracles, which by definition, defy all the laws of nature?

Religion is not just about miracles; it is about holding and implementing values, ethics, and morals; the judgment between right and wrong. The spirituality component is what compels most of us to judge our actions, though some people claim to detach spirituality from religion as well, placing both 'religious' and 'spiritual' as separate philosophies. That is another debate though.

The influence of zodiacs and stars on the lives of every single individual, sitting gazillion of miles away from us in this expansive universe, is a miracle in itself.

Science and Religion - One Entity

Like science, religion is also a theory to interpret the universe.

The absence of evidence is not the evidence of absence'. Carl Sagan, one of the most controversial American astronomers, planetary scientist, and science communicator quoted this and since has become a tired cliché. - Community: Celebrate customer use-cases; share stories of real-world impact

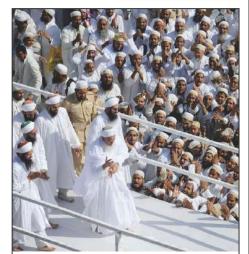

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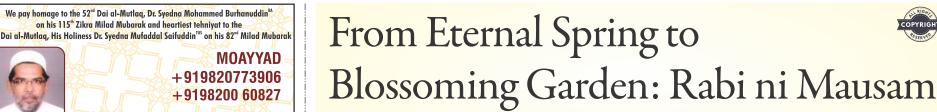

The vast sky, the stars, the beautiful colors of the earth, the life hidden in a drop of water, and the fragrance of a flower all testify to His wisdom and mercy.

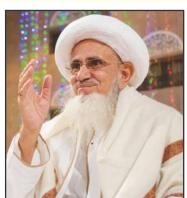

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Lanterns of Guidance: From Fatimi Wisdom to the 82nd Milād Mubārak

From the dawn of Islam in the early seventh century, the pursuit of knowledge was woven into the very fabric of faith. In those first blessed days, Muslims would gather to listen to the Prophet Mohammed's^{SA} luminous words, his sermons and addresses, and to hear and discuss the revelations of the Holy Qur'an. These assemblies were more than meetings; they were living rivers of wisdom, flowing from Mohammed Rasulallah's saw heart to the hearts of his companions. His noble progeny carried these traditions forward, their homes and masjids becoming sanctuaries of learning where scholars, jurists, and seekers of every kind came together to study Islamic theology, philosophy, jurisprudence, and the sacred sciences.

In the radiant Fatimi era of Egypt, this love of learning blossomed into a culture of education unparalleled in its depth and reach. Friday sermons stirred minds and souls alike: vast public halqas (majestic circles of discussion) gathered in masjids; formal instruction illuminated texts of Qur'anic interpretation, theology, and law. In the year 975, the Fatimi Imam al-Mu'izz^{AS} founded Al-Azhar University, which even today stands as one of the world's oldest living universities, a beacon that has never dimmed. Its fame spread across the Muslim world for the excellence of its teaching and for the generosity that offered free boarding to every student who sought knowledge there.

Not long after, in 1005, the Fatimi Imam al-Hākim^{AS} established the House of Knowledge in Cairo, a magnet for brilliant minds from every corner of the world. Its halls resounded with inquiry and discovery: history, literature, jurisprudence, lexicology, grammar, astronomy, law, and medicine all found their place there. Thousands of works filled its vast library, open to any soul yearning for illumination.

Among the most profound of Fatimi traditions were the Majālis al-Hikma; special gatherings of wisdom where men and women alike sat humbly on the floors of masjids or palace halls, hearts alight, seeking truths that transcended time. The very word majlis, meaning a place of sitting,



hearts with knowledge and wisdom

speaks of reverence: disciples gathered in quiet dignity, drawn by the magnet of divine knowledge.

Centuries later, this golden chain of learning shone anew. Svedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA} restored Jāmi' al-Anwar to its original glory, and by the barakat of this luminous work, Al-Aqmar Masjid too was revived. Al-Aqmar's story is a jewel in itself: built by Imam al-Āmir, the twentieth Fatimi Imam, it bears a timeless sign of the heavens:

و من اياته الليل والنهار والشمسر و القمر

Among His signs are the night and the day and the sun and the moon.

This verse is not merely cosmic poetry; it is a mirror of Fatimi belief. The sun, whose brilliance commands the day, yields in turn to the moon, whose cool radiance reflects that very light. Night follows day, day follows night an eternal rhythm that none can deny. According to Fatimi doctrine, the A'immat Tāhirīn are these divine signs (āyāt Allāh), the beacons guiding humankind to liberation. The Imam is the blazing sun; when the sun sets, the moon; the Dā'ī shines forth, reflecting the Imam's light to believers in the quiet of night.

It was Imam al-Āmir^{AS} who, in an act of sublime foresight, appointed Syedna Zoeb^{RA} as the first Dā'ī al-Mutlaq, under the blessed guidance of Moulatena Hurratul Maleka^{AS}. From that moment, the priceless stream of 'ilm flowed from one Dā'ī to the next, unbroken and eternal.

Dā'ī che masjid ne masjid che dā'ī, jeelta beve bajā che. Zāhir mā beve judā che, va laikin bāṭin mā beve milā che.

Masjid che jussa ne jeev che dā'ī, jussa mā jeev sadā che.

Tahqeeq ye beve ghar che Khudā nā, beve mā utra Khudā che.

The Dā'ī and the masjid are mirrors of each other; outwardly distinct, inwardly one. The masjid is the body, the Dāʿī its living soul; together they are the twin abodes of the Divine.

Like the mishkāt al-anwār, the niche of light, Syedna Burhanuddin^{RA} himself was a living miracle, radiating the nur of Allah. Forty years ago, the design of this sacred mishkāt, once a hidden Fatimi relic, was revealed anew. In the days of Imam al-Hākim^{AS}, 400 lanterns once hung in that masjid. When the time came to restore it, Syedna Burhanuddin's^{RA} gaze fell upon a single stone of

Jāmi' al-Aqmar. There, engraved upon its façade, was the ancient design of the lantern. He pointed it out, and thus the mishkāt was born

In Fatimi understanding, the Imam is the very repository of Allah's light, illuminating the true path for His people. The Dāʿī in turn spreads that light, so that each heart may kindle its own flame of guidance.

The Mishkāt verse carries a universe of meaning:

In the Fatimi/Tayyebi esoteric interpretation, the Mishqāt (niche) represents the heart (qalb) of the Prophet or the Imām / Dāʿī, serving as a vessel where divine light gathers and shines. The Zujāja (glass lamp) symbolizes the purified soul. transparent enough to transmit the divine light without obstruction. The Misbāh (lamp or flame) is the nūr of divine guidance, manifest through the Imām, and in his seclusion, through the Dāʿī al-Muṭlaq. The oil from a blessed tree signifies the Imam's knowledge ('ilm), which is selfsufficient and in no need of external spark. It is light from light, pure and radiant in essence. Together, these symbols reveal how divine wisdom flows from the Prophet and the Imām to the believers through the Dāʿī's luminous guidance.

Thus, the mishkāt becomes the very heart chosen by God to contain and reflect His eternal light, first in the Prophet, then the Imams, and in the Tayyebi age, the Dā'īs who carry that trust.

Syedna Mohammed Burhanuddin^{RA}, carrying the barakat of Anwar and Aqmar forward, raised Masjid-e-Moazzam (Of Syedna Abdeali Saifuddin^{RA}) in Surat, a testament to that same

Within its sacred walls, brassand-glass lanterns glow softly near the mihrab, echoing the Qur'anic mishkāt: a niche containing a lamp. Their gentle golden light, filtered through engraved glass, recalls the

verse of Light itself...nūr 'alā nūr; light upon light. To the faithful, Syedna Burhanuddin^{RA} was the living mishkāt of his age: as the lantern holds the flame and disperses only pure radiance, he too received the nur of the concealed Imām and transmitted it through guidance, scholarship, and tender compassion.

Often, he would sit beneath those very lanterns, his serene presence embodying that heavenly metaphor. And today, in Syedna Aali Qadr Mufaddal Saifuddin TUS we witness the same living niche, the same undimmed brilliance of guidance.

For the past six years, the Milād Mubārak of Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin^{TUS} has unfolded as a season of learning and grace. Thousands journey to Surat from every corner of the earth for al-Istifāda al-'Ilmiyya, a series of luminous seminars inspired by the timeless Fatimi educational tradition. This gathering is no mere commemoration; it is the very heartbeat of the Islamic ideal that the ceaseless seeking of knowledge and its practice leads to a life of fulfillment and divine purpose.

As we rejoice in the dual Milad of our two Dā'īs, our souls taste the honey of gratitude. Our inner vessels brim with divine knowledge, our hearts overflow with shukr for the path we are shown; ihdina ș-șirāț al-mustaqīm, the straight road that Mufaddal Moula^{TUS} leads us upon. With every majlis, every bayan, he lifts our spirits toward higher stations of salvation, step by step.

And so, in this celebration, we bow in sajdat al-shukr, praising the Almighty who has blessed us with a guide whose light uplifts us beyond measure. Truly, khudā nu hamd ane shukr: in the light of Burhanuddin Moula^{RA}, and in the continuing radiance of Mufaddal Moula^{TUS}, we witness nūr 'alā nūr: light upon light. until our very souls become reflections of that eternal brilliance.

Arrival by Land, Sea or Air

For all its proximity to Mumbai, Alibaug has long faced a single challenge: seasonal accessibility. Most arrivals still depend on public ferries from Bhaucha Dhakka to the Mandwa jetty. These are often disrupted during the monsoon, while private yachts operating from the Taj jetty are equally dependent on weather conditions.

Araaya proposes a different kind of arrival experience:

- \bullet A Private Jetty by Tricone at Tarabandar is planned to provide exclusive, year-round access, a rarity in the region
- A dedicated Tricone Catamaran Boat Service is planned to offer a direct 50-minute connection from Mumbai
- A Private Road Access will wind through farmland, connecting seamlessly to the Murud-Alibaug highway
- A planned helipad will complete a future-ready network of land, sea and air connectivity

This infrastructure is being designed to address Alibaug's greatest constraint and to position Araaya as a destination that remains accessible in every season with the discretion and ease UHNI families expect.



Living with the Land

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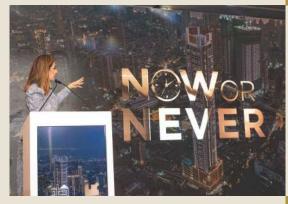
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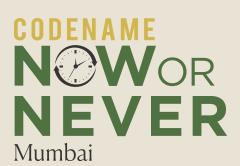
